A TALK BY ADRIAN DANDO, TOWN CRIER OF NORTON RADSTOCK

I suppose I should start this write up with the famous phrase "O-Yeah, O-Yeah", I thought you would think it was a corny joke. Adrian came along to share something of his experiences of being a town crier. Radstock had a town crier for many years, the last being as late as 1912. As many will already know the purpose of such an official was to announce various important and newsworthy items to villages and townspeople, dating back many, many years. In those days very few people could read and there were no newspapers. Like many towns, Radstock decided to resurrect the post of town crier some years ago, to add to its municipal pride and prestige. I think much of this comes with European town twinning. Naturally, Adrian was dressed in his 'uniform'. He explained that after hiring a costume for the 'Norton Radstock Town Crier' competition and winning that competition he would have to have a suitable outfit made for permanent use. Fortunately, Adrian's Godmother came to his rescue and made his splendid suit consisting of black knee length breeches, white ballet dancers tights, a full white shirt with ruff collar and cuffs, a long brocade waistcoat in deep maroon, a long red coat with black and gold facing and a tri-cornered hat, (which Adrian said was actually a 'Dunn & Co.' Chaplins hat suitably re-worked by Aunty). Adrian regaled with various stories of anecdotes with regards to his unpaid work as a town crier. He opens many shops, officiates as a Toast Master, plus much work in connection with charity. In all, he can make 107 appearances per year, no mean feat, when you consider that he is the Landlord of a public house, namely the White Post, Westfield. The talk was concluded by Adrian telling us about some of his oversea visits, to attend International Town Crier competitions. I think Adrian came a very creditable thirteenth out of one hundred and seven competitors, in Canada. Adrian couldn't leave without giving us a presentation 'Cry' which he did, afterwards answering many questions regarding diction, voice control etc. Forty members, families and friends enjoyed a most interesting and amusing evening which shows that not every meeting has to have an engine or technical slant.
