ANNUAL RALLY, MONKTON FARLEIGH MINE - 14/15 June

Many rally write-ups start with weather reports, and this one is no exception, as up to this particular weekend the amount of blue sky wasn't enough to make a pair of sailors trousers, as the saying goes, but this weekend there was enough to kit out the whole navy and by Sunday afternoon it got so hot I had to retreat to the Mine cafe for some shade and watch the rest of the exhibitors go pinker and pinker, but having said that, I also think the fine weather played a great part in the success of the rally.

We had a superb turn out of engines to cater for all enthusiasts tastes and the standard of restoration get better every year, and can only reflect the amount of hard work and patience that owners shower on their machinery, even if a certain member turns his engine off and turns the number around during the judging period!!!

I hope everyone was happy with the site your Committee chose after looking at several, and finally deciding on the Mine with its attraction of a 'secret underground city', the largest known underground ammunition dump in the world, where we were able to offer our members and families half price tickets for a guided tour of the mine, and over 200 tickets were sold.

For the first time we invited entries from cars, motor-bikes, tractors and commercials, and what a splendid selection entered our show. Although visiting members of the public were somewhat lacking, this seemed to be the only complaint; I hope everyone enjoyed the weekend. The Saturday evening Bar-b-que was a great success and well supported with approximately 150 people, which kept the ladies of the Committee hard pressed all night keeping up with the demand for food, and how nice to have our guest Chef, Tony Jones, along with his expert touch for turning out beefburgers and sausages, nearly 280, were sold. Brian Box supplied the bar, and kept all those thirsty people happy, whilst our evening entertainment was supplied by Al Fresco with his jokes and music which went down very well and ended up with 'dancing on the tarmac' for the last hour. At half time we had our usual raffle with numerous prizes, many of which were donated, and thanks to Brian, Audrey and Chris for selling tickets during the midday sun and to Herb for his efforts in the evening. Our Club stall did a very good trade on both days, and thanks to all the people for their generous donations of articles to sell. Hopefully, our paying stall holders did as well as us; one of them told me he had taken more money at our rally than he had the previous week at a rally that had a several thousand gate.

Once again we supplied each exhibitor with an information card to display in front of their engine,

and apparently they also make good gaskets, so they had their uses at the end of the day.

At 3.00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon our President, Tom Randall, made the presentation to the award winners, which are as follows:- best Horizontal Engine, Mr. Alan Barrett with his 5 hp 1925 Challenge; best Vertical Engine, Mr. Brian Verrall with his 1920 3 hp Glasgow; Junior Shield for best Junior Engine, J. Webber with a 1960 Lister D; best Working Engine (Committee Cup. J.A. Marlow's $3\frac{1}{2}$ hp Lister 'A' type driving a Bamford No.1 Corn Mill; best Visitors Engine went to Mr. Les Aldridge with his 1920 3 hp Glasgow.

Rosettes were given to the following:- best Car, D. Maybee with his 1935 18 h.p. Austin Chalfont. This was a very difficult task for the Committee to judge as all the cars were superbly restored. The tractor chosen was a 1942 Fordson Standard owned by Mr. Brian Lovell. Best Motor Cycle, D.D. Ackerman with a 1949 Sunbeam S8, and last but by no means least, best Steam Vehicle went to Mr.

Ron Torr with his $4\frac{1}{2}$ inch scale model, Marshall Traction Engine.

Tom congratulated the award winners and thanked everyone for supporting the rally. For my part, to round up this report, I must thank everyone who helped to make this rally so enjoyable by giving up part of their weekend to assist with the hard work and effort that is required to put on a rally. Also

to Malcolm Fleet for the loan of his flat-bed lorry for the Bar-b-que to put Al Fresco and his equipment on, and thanks to all members and friends who donated articles for the Club stall and prizes for the raffle.
