SCIENCE MUSEUM OPEN DAY, WROUGHTON

This report is written with a spectator's eye. We (my wife and I) arrived at Wroughton after Sunday lunch. Wroughton is a war-time airfield set on the edge of the downs above Swindon with panoramic views. During the war, 15 M.U. and 76 M.U. were based here; now the airfield is a Naval Aircraft Yard. However, for this show, the runways were used as car parks, full from end to end. After a lengthy walk, we came upon two huge ploughing engines, a McClaren and a Fowler hauling a Fowler six furrow plough across about half a mile of land. In the same area also ploughing, were a pair of Shire horses, a 1918 Titan tractor, a 1943 Standard Fordson, and a modern Ford 8200 pulling a six furrow plough; a fine example of the evolution of ploughing. After watching for a while, we approached a temporary railway line, upon which a full sized replica of the locomotive "Rocket" was doing a brisk trade in rides; judging by the length of the queue. We then arrived outside hanger D4, along the East side of which were the Wessex and Cotswold Engine Clubs separate enclosures - why separate? The only Wessex engine which I recognised was Eric's Amanco, having met him and Tony Jones at Uffington Rally only two weeks previously. The Wessex members present were John Emery with his 1923 Ruston Hornsby IP (magnificently restored; Robin Lambert's 1931 Ruston Hornsby PB & mechanical hacksaw; Dave Cleaver and his Lister DK; Bill Appleby with his Lister J and Ian Skuse and his Wolseley Sheep Shearing outfit. As Eric was the only Wessex member I knew, the usual nattering took place; this resulted in my being "conned" into writing this article (no hard feelings Eric!! just a bit of help from a far flung member). Next, it was on to the other compound as I know several Cotswold members. As far as I can remember, there were two Petters, a Bamford, Lister Diesel, Lister D-types, and a Lister A, all in all, a good show of engines, attracting a crowd of interested spectators. was then dragged away by Jean, my wife, into D4 hanger to see all manner of stalls and exhibits. There were various Railway, Canal, Transport, Marine and Aircraft Preservation Societies in here. On the COEPS stand there was a very interesting Wolseley $1\frac{1}{2}$ hp engine of the 1923-37 period, awaiting restoration. On then to Hanger D3 which once housed Lancasters, Spitfires, and, in later years, Canberras. In here, the Science Museum has a display of cars, horse-drawn vehicles, two ploughing engines, some of Fred Smith's collection of tractors, combines, pea-pickers, and also space rockets and other space hardware. Up in the roof of this hanger was a space satellite, also a pedal powered aircraft made of wood and plastic film; the most flimsy aircraft I have ever seen. Outside this hanger was a Showman's engine powering a Fair Organ. At this point, Jean had decided she had seen enough so I continued on my own. I headed for C3 Hanger in which I had once worked, being overtaken on the way by an unknown Wessex member buzzing past on a powered pedal cycle which I remembered seeing in the Wessex compound earlier. (Probably Stuart "Ton-Up" Ashman...Ed). Outside the Hanger, a line of Vintage buses, vans and lorries were running trips around the air-field. Inside were aircraft of yesteryear; a 1934 De Havilland Rapide, 1934 Douglas DC3, 1933 Boeing 247D (flown from Florida this year via Greenland and Iceland), Comet in Dan-Air colours, Aero-engines, a Trident recently taken out of service, and many more lorries, vans and engines. A final walk around the Hanger and it was time for that long trek back to the car after a very pleasant afternoon. I hope all Wessex exhibitors had an equally pleasant day out and a safe journey home.

TROWBRIDGE COUNTRY FAIR

On Saturday 4th September I went to Trowbridge Park Country Fair. There was nine engines on show, proudly presented by their owners. There was Mark Tilly's 1926 2 hp Ruston Hornsby, John Emery's 1923 Ruston Hornsby - this was a nice engine, Rod Lambert's 1947 Petter $1\frac{1}{2}$ hp; he also had a bicycle, Bill Appleby's 1936 Ruston Hornsby 8 hp, and Tony Jones' 1926 Crossley 3 hp. 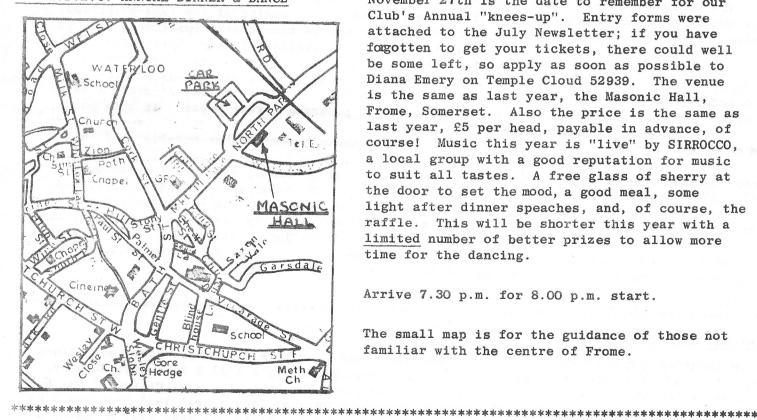
NESTON PARK RALLY (I)
