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WHITE METAL BEARINGS

After reading in the Stationary Engine Magazine about restoring white metal bearings, I wondered if Wessex members would be interested in yet another method which has been used on big-end and main bearings on an 8 hp Ruston Hornsby AP that Bill Appleby and myself acquired last year.

First of all we found some good quality plumbers metal, which was put into a cast-iron melting pot with a gas torch underneath, and the ladle to be used for pouring resting across the top to keep warm. (NOTE: A cold ladle put into hot molten metal can cause a nasty EXPLOSION within the pot and you could get a bad BURN...). While the metal was slowly melting, a piece of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " angle iron about 2ft long had been cleaned up to bright on the inside, and laid on the two bricks with the 'V' uppermost. The molten metal was poured gently along the groove to make lft lengths of metal just a bit thicker than a drinking-straw; about thirty of these rods were made, if you find that they won't come out nice and straight and slim, melt them down again until you get the hand of it. Keep on skimming off all the impurities from the top of the pot. A good temperature guide for the metal is to place a piece of paper into the molten metal, if it catches fire, the metal is too hot.

The next stage was to be done by a local engineer who laid the split bearings in a steel tray with about 1 of water in the bottom and packed muslin cloths around the shells to keep the outsides of the shells cool so that they would not distort when the metal was 'run'. Using an oxy-acetylene torch with a very gentle flame, he warmed up the surface of the shell and began to weld on or 'run' the rods onto the surface, gradually building up as he went and being careful all the time not to burn the shell. About 8 or 9 passes up and down had the shell covered with approx. $\frac{1}{4}$ " of new metal. When all six halves had been done, they were held together with jubilee clips to keep them in their pairs. Next, onto the lathe, where they were skimmed out gently in a four-jaw check to the measurements required. The oil-grooves were done on a milling machine but with care could be done by hand, if one never had access to a machine. When the bearings were installed back into the engine, very little hand scraping had to be done as the lathe was a great help in getting down to a fine tolerance. We have run the engine now for about 20 hours, and all seems to be O.K.; the time involved to rebuild these six shells was about three days. I hope this may be of some help to anyone wondering what to do about worn white metal bearings.
