# MODEL ENGINEERS EXHIBITION. Alexandra Palace - 29th December to 5th January.

A chance remark by a work colleague led me to arrive at this show not quite sure what to expect, having only a few times ventured to our capital city and not always been impressed by the city way of life.

From the outside, Alexandra Palace itself looks a grand and majestic building situated on top of a hill overlooking a large part of London. Once it was the home of the British Broadcasting Corporation, its huge pylon type mast is still in situ on top of the building

which is surrounded by parks and woodland walks, a very pleasant location.

Having paid the £5 entrance fee the first exhibition hall housed a large indoor lake for all the model boats to sail around and different clubs would give a commentary on various models sailing around the lake. Lighweight model aircraft were flying around another part of this hall. The type we all used to make with rubber bands to drive the propellor, after launching they all flew in a large circle with a fixed rudder and some seemed to stay in the air so long you had to give up watching and go and look at something else.

Once inside the main hall this was to be what I had really come to see, superbly modelled engines, trains, boats, planes and vehicles of every description. Judging of the exhibits must have taken place as many had awards alongside, some depiting the Duke of Edinburgh gold and silver medals. An interesting challenge was put to the model engineers to see how much power they could produce from a night-light (a candle). Lots of ingenious apparatus took up the challenge and a popular one was a miniature hot air engine driving a dynamo. All around the hall were trade stands stacked with tools and material for those who were looking for bits and pieces, a few bargains to be had but lots of things seemed very expensive to me.

For five and a half hours I was captivated by what was on view and would certainly like to go again next year. A shame its so far to travel but there it is. A useful tip for anyone who would like to go is to travel early and try and arrive not later than 11.00 a.m. as all the car parks fill up quickly.

A JOURNEY BACK IN TIME - Part 2.

Last month we were taken back to the last century to visit a gunpowder works in Cornwall, this month the guided tour continues.

Back in the summer of 1990, we noticed a new nature trail sign near our favourite caravan site in Cornwall, and decided to explore further. We parked the car and set off down the narrow footpath, the gate posts along the path showed that at one time it has been much wider. Down the narrow valley we went accompanied by the sound of running water as yet unseen. Now and again we came across the foundations of ruined buildings some quite extensive, although their purpose we couldn't guess. At several places great blocks of granite were piled up as if to form a wall, collapsed in places and pushed aside by trees. The foot path lead past each wheel house in turn, all the machinery now long gone, broken portions of stone millstones litter the site. At the head of the valley, we sat down for a rest and speculated on what the mills had been for. With a little imagination I could hear the wheels turning the mills, the shouts of workers and the clatter of horses on the cobbled road. My mind wandered back to over one hundred years ago to see how things must have been then - a busy and thriving industry.

I did buy the scales, but the best is yet to come, What are you going to use them for? she asked, I told her I was going to display them with my old corn mill and engine at steam rallies and vintage shows. Now before I knew what was happening the dear lady was on the phone, and fifteen minutes later I was sat with Mr. Freeman in his farm house. He had an old engine on the farm he wanted to sell.

We arranged a time when I could go and have a look at the wee beasty. Sunday saw me once again heading for Hullavington village.
