### CRANK-UP AT THE OLD DOWN INN.



### RUSHMOOR STEAM & VINTAGE SHOW 25TH/26TH JULY.

How nice it was to be back at the Rushmoor Arena once again, many exhibitors thought that as the last show was in 1995, with a two year gap it may, never take place again, but I'm sure that when this years entry forms dropped through their letter boxes, they were returned post haste as to exhibit here is in my opinion most enjoyable. The Stationary Engine steward here is Patrick Knight who if you have never met him you will most certainly have seen his excellent photographs and articles in The Stationary Engine Magazine. On checking in with Pat you are free to choose your own engine location in any one of the three large pens, camping is in a beautiful woodland area that looks down onto the huge rally field, again you choose your own spot. This year the rally was slightly scaled down perhaps because it clashed with Netley Marsh and perhaps exhibitors thought there would be no more rallies here, and went elsewhere, but scaled down or not there was plenty to see.

Details from the free programme were as follows:— 91 stationary engines, 59 tractors, 64 motor bikes, 76 cars, 74 commercial vehicles, 111 military vehicles, 9 organs, 27 full size steam engines and 25 model engines— 36 displays in the model tent, so lots on the field to look at. Also scattered around the field was an old fashioned fairground, craft tent, lots of fast food stalls, beer tent, and of course the usual Saturday night entertainment with Penny Rigdens can can girls!!! A Punch & Judy show to keep the little ones entertained as did the rare breeds sheep tent.

Quite a few Wessex members exhibit here and took along a nice selection of engines which included a 1920 Delco-Light, 2 hp International, Fairbanks Bulldog, 6 hp International,  $2\frac{1}{4}$  hp Amanco and in the model tent club member Reuben Smith displayed his collection of 2" scale ploughs, and amongst the large steam engines club member Phil Tracy had his 1901 Aveling & Porter Roller, (sorry I never got to see you Phil but I'm sure I will catch up with you sometime during the year). The auto jumble was in its usual place on the terraced slopes and although it was mainly car bits there is always the odd things to interest me tucked in there somewhere.

The show seemed fairly well attended by the paying public as the weather was very summery except for a small amount of drizzle late on Sunday. I hope this didn't put anyone off visiting the show as I'm sure every penny received will be put to good use, and who knows perhaps another show next year. Dear Editor, I visited Wychwood District Vintage Country Show July 18th/19th. This is situated near Burford, Oxon., on the site of the Blue Cross Animal Welfare which is just outside Burford on the Carterton Road. I took my Lister a/c 1934 and a Godwin water pump with all parts to go with it. Belt, water tank, two fuel cans, it soon filled up the car, no room for wife, this was a weekend away for me (I stayed with my Daughter in Burford, no D.W.E.) The last time I went to this show it clashed with Fairford Air Show and I was stuck in traffic for two hours, and did about a mile and a half. This year this was not going to happen again, a new route was planned, but no need, the Air Show had moved its date so all was well - no traffic jam, this by the way is approaching Lechlade. On arriving at the show field which is behind the Blue Cross buildings I found my way to the stationary engine lines, there were about 4 of these and almost 200 engines, and set up my engine and pump, the weather was still dry, surprise, surprise. After fuelling the Lister with paraffin, lining up the pump belt, fill up with water the engine and pump, all was set to start up, not many about so I delayed this and had a walk around the Show, the field is typical Cotswold, the stone is only just below the surface so it drys out rapidly, so it was clean underfoot. There were lots of car boots and stalls for the ladies to peruse, a vintage sale was held on the Saturday, lots of things here, engines, wheels, lawn mowers, boxes of things unknown, bits of tractors and other oddments, I am not a sale man myself so I

passed on to other things. Motorcycles there were 39 of, these dating from 1911, a Royal Enfield, to the sixties a good cross section of the bikes of this era. There were 19 commercials all looking good in their gleaming paint work, these ranged from 1937 up to the 1960's. The tractors, all the well known makes were present plus a few rarer beasts such as a Gunsmith 1948, British Anzario 1938 and a Titan. The cars, there were 81 of these ranging from 1933 up to 1978. The Motor cycles, cars and tractors all paraded in the main ring on Saturday and Sunday. Now back to the stationary engines, these were some nice engines here, and some unusual ones, a Fielding & Platt  $12\frac{1}{2}$  hp 1922, running like a clock on the two days, a twin Fowler of  $14\frac{1}{2}$  hp 1937, a 6 hp Fowler 1938, these two came from Exeter, I had not seen the like of these before, another Fowler was radiator cooled the owner said he thought is was probably the sole survivor of its type 6 hp 1937. The largest engine was a Crossley 1924  $13\frac{1}{2}$  hp, this machine was by my engine and was easier to start than my Lister, one pull after the lamp had done its work and away it went. Philip T/E was there with his Petter 'M' 5 hp 1931 driving a water pump, all this equipment was up to Philips usual high standard of restoration, the Petter sounded great, had a real bark to the exhaust, and Philip was seen with the dreaded Petter spots on face, neck and coat!! Of course this was pointed out to me, the answer 'You can't have a Petter without a few spots'. There was a nice pair of Deutz engines, one of 4 hp and one of 2 hp. These engine men had come from far and wide to this show, Milton Keynes, Cambridge, Newbury, Northampton, Swansea and Bristol, not bad for a once small show is it?

My engine ran well for the weekend and the weather was fine, it was a bit windy at times. All too soon it was Sunday evening and time to load up the trailer and car and head for home, it had been two pleasant days spent with new friends and old, I will be returning again next year all being well.
