


WESSEX STATIONARY ENGINE CLUB LIMITED

WEST BAY (BRIDPORT) RALLY. Saturday & Sunday 10th & 11th June 2006

This was a special event this year for the West Dorset Vintage Tractor and Stationary Engine Club as it celebrated it's 30th Anniversary. I can recall this club's early rallies that were once held at Looke Farm, Puncknowle not far from Swyre way back in the late 1970's. Last winter I was working in the area and I had a walk across the old rally field and what memories came flooding back, too many to mention, but it was nice to have been part of that scene and the new friendships that were made still remain to this very day, but enough of this remonising and back to West Bay.

I have never seen so many stationary engines here before, over 250 this year, I think that the organisers were taken aback by this number, most were there for the 2 days with only a few one day only's, for those who haven't attended this show before the show field is almost an island located next

to West Bay Harbour a more beautiful setting would be hard to find.

All the usual exhibits were here, motorcycles, vintage cars & commercials, several giant Scammell Army recovery trucks, and a huge stall section to keep the browsers happy. An auction took place on the Saturday morning with a few hundred lots of all descriptions including tools and spares if you can name it, it was here. A lot of WSEC member exhibit here, some even make a week of it by finding campsites close by and pulling into the show on the Thursday.

The Barnes brothers from Poole, brought along a few large unusual engines, including an Andrews and a Hornsby, they run so nice and are impeccably restored. John & Ed Thorne exhibited their Robinson hot air engine, but I think they were having difficulties with speed control as blustery gusts of wind affected the gas burner making the engine speed up. Club member Les Ricketts had his 4hp Ruston & Hornsby model AP which ran quite well for a while then proved problematic with several small faults that needed sorting two of which was an exhaust valve sticking in it's guide and a magneto that required resetting up to maximise it's spark and after some on the spot maintenance it was soon up and running again.

Friday & Saturday evening had entertainment in the beer tent but for some of us it was a stroll around the new harbour in the warm evening breeze followed by a bag of chips on our way back to the

22nd Annual 1000 Engine Rally, 24th/25th June, Astle Park, Cheshire

This is probably one of the longest distances I travel to an event, approximately 180 miles and 4½ hours journey but I know that from the moment I arrive at this venue the adrenalin will start to flow. I also know from past experiences here that I am in for an enjoyable time, I very much like the friendly atmosphere created by the organisers from the reception on arrival at the park entrance to the engine stewards, everything is designed for us exhibitors to enjoy what we like doing most, it's also handy to be able to choose where you set up your display and keep a space for your friends enabling you to have a good look around the show and leave someone in charge of your engine and then you can do the same for them. A novel way of bringing the engine water around is via a giant airfield Carmichael Fire Engine which is a most interesting exhibit in it's own right.

This year there was well over 400 engines here in half a dozen roped off pens (no metal crowd barriers here to mar the publics view). Most makes and models were well represented here except for

one that I was looking out for this being a Stuart P55 twin lighting plant, but never mind.

The Five Counties Vintage Machinery Organisation Ltd which run this event has their usual club tent and area set aside for 'items for sale' which was well supported, the outside compound had lots of engines and equipment on offer including a 5hp B.W &.C.Wks Victoria which I thought was over priced at £1250.00 but very nice for the seller if he can get it. Inside the club tent hundreds of items on offer from magnetos, spare engine parts, old hand books and magazines, tools, fuel cans, and an old Geryk Air Pump this brought back memories for me as I once had two of these and they do make interesting exhibits.

On Saturday evening as on other years buses left the field for The Anson Museum at Poynton. You have to book your seat on the coaches and I was told that this was all sold out by 10.30am which shows what a popular trip this is. If you have never been to the Anson Museum before do try and make the effort as it must now have one of Europe's biggest collection of stationary engines. The curator Geoff Challinor with the help of teams of volunteers had many of the engines up and running and one that I would like to have took back home with me was a 2½hp Furnival Gas Engine that was driving a printing press, it ran so nice and quiet with its exhaust piped outside the building all we can hear was a clicking of valves opening and closing with a slight whoosh of the piston on each stroke. Many of the engines displayed here were manufactured in and around the Midlands including Tangye, Bates & Scholes, National Gas, Gardner, Ruston and Crossley. A new star attraction this year was an atmospheric engine that spent it's working life in Bristol. It's a single cylinder vertical engine that stands approximately 12 ft high, with it's flywheels high up above the machine, a shot of gas is injected into the ground level cylinder then ignited sending the piston upwards, attached to the top of the piston is a long toothed rack which flies out of the upper most part of the engine and engages with a ratchet on it's way back down which in turn rotates the shaft holding the flywheels. All rather complicated but very interesting to look at.

We usually stay on after the rally and take a weeks holiday to justify the long distance travelled but this year we could only spare three days so we left the caravan at home and found a Travel Lodge not too far away from the rally site, this worked quite well. To sum up, a great weekend, well worth the long journey as I am sure a lot of Wessex members who also made this trip would agree.
