

There was so much to see there, around 50 stationary engines organised by club member David Upton. A dozen or more miniature steam engines, vintage cars, tractors, motorbikes and commercials were neatly placed around the well kept playing field.

Around 50 stalls were in situ selling all the bits and pieces that we all like browse. A large open space was kept vacant for some interesting displays including a huge vintage combine harvester. It simulated what it was built to do.

Anti-Freeze Crank up, Sun 1st Dec At Nunney Catch transport café By Brian Baker

I arrived at around 9am to see all of exhibiters already in the line up. The car park area was very soon filled with engines including engines I had never seen before at Wessex events, some very rare, and some the only one in existence. Andy Vincent had a "Germanus" inverted engine that was a replica from 1895 and was only built 10 years ago. This was a brilliant engine that ran like a clock, how someone replicated all the castings and machined the complicated parts is beyond me.

Ed and John Thorne had a Harrop open crank made in Sheffield, this had just resleeved and was the first time it had run since it had rebuilt. Sam Jackson has an interesting engine, a "Christenson" 1909, open crank, type B, imported from the USA in 2007. Robin had his "Smokey Joe" Stuart generating set; he has some different fuel now so it isn't destroying the planet. Don and William Rogers always seem to have something different, the latest addition was a very nice early 1½hp Gardner, and the very large 4½ hp Olds open crank engine, also Don Rogers had his Bulldog. Roger Pike had a very

smart Leek engine; I had not seen that before. Ben Rowland, when of our younger members, had a nice Lister "L", 5hp 1925. Ashley Humphries had a exceptionally nice Petter M 1 ½ hp in distinctive red colour, Ashley told me he brush painted the engine, I could not have been a better job if I have sprayed it. it was certainly a credit to you Ashley. Another nice Petter 1 ½ hp was brought by Jamie Coates. One engine that I would like to own is Roger Kempsons Norman 1 3/4 hp OHV with generator, these engines remind me of motor cycle motors, I would certainly like when of these engines. A rare engine was exhibited by Paul Allen, a Monarch, 1 3/4 hp of 1915 vintage. Our Vice Chairman Eric displayed a Fuller and Johnson, 2 ½ hp, circa 1923. Kevin Phillips had his Fairbanks Morse 1 1/2 hp 1920, Carol didn't came today as she had to tend to their sick dog. Ed and Gloria Carp had an Amanco 1 1/2 1923 vintage that was ex Cecil Giblett. A very splendid restoration. including a suburb oak trolley, was carried out by Ralph Champion on a Gilson 1 ½ hp "Johnny on Spot" engine. Another very unusual engine was a petrol/ paraffin Lion, with an unusual magneto drive by a rack driving a gear going back and foreword to flick the magneto at ivs point of maximum flux. The owner, Simon Coles, had to construct the magneto tripping mechanism from scratch with nothing to copy. Adrian Grant had a French Bernard, OHV, with a nice Lion Pump. Trevor Wilcox brought a large 4hp Bamford and Pump 1922. John Bullock had a Stuart 600; quite a large engine for only ½hp, circa 1920s. This was a varied assortment of engines, more that I had never been at Nunney before, and we never had one "Lister D" - that has to be first!

I counted 28 engines in total, plus Keith's model steamer and Paul Martins Transit Ambulance complete with a "body" on the stretcher.

An interesting exhibit by Alan Rogers was a crop sprayer and several Teagle Hedge Cutters.

I my opinion this has to be the best crank-up for a long time, with the amount of engines and the quality of exhibits. The café had good trade this time, and our raffle had never had as many prizes before, thanks to the generosity pf our members. Thanks to Christine Rogers and Linda Pike who sold the tickets to collect the magnificent sum of £120.
