LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Brian.

I attended the Portland Steam & Vintage Show last year, and they would like to invite any W.S.E.C. member to their Rally on Sat/Sun 18th/19th August 2001. This is their 3rd year, and because of its success has now been classed as a major event by the Tourist Dept. of the Weymouth & Portland Borough Council. There is 25-30 acres of flat lawn area for exhibitors. Anyone wishing to stay for the weekend period, there is free live entertainment with bar on the Saturday evening. Overnight camping Friday & Saturday, but there are no electric hook-ups.

ROGER PARSONS.

I used all the tricks in the book and out of it to free that piston all to no avail, I even tried to push the piston out by putting a small jack into the crank case with a steel plate fixed across the conrod at the big end but my courage left me after a few strokes on the jack handle (you can't get new crank cases for Petter Victory models) and I could see myself with a lot of bits of cast iron if I was not very careful so out came the jack and back to thinking what else I could do to remove the piston and conrod. Now what you must realise dear reader is that I had been trying to remove the said piston for six months, using plus gas, diesel, heat and everything else I could think of. I do not like brute force but a time comes when this is the only way left. I obtained a block of oak, this I shaped to fit into the bore and carved the end to fit over the piston deflector so that the block was in contact with all of the piston not just touching in one place. Now it was time to pray for I was about to hit the oak bung with a 14lb hammer, deep breath and swing, crack, one good hit, take out block and see how far the piston had moved. Not one xxxxxy thou so back in went the lump of oak and I decided to give it one more blow that would put fear into the heart of any engine man. I once again removed the wood, had the piston moved? Yes about 1/8" but when I took hold of conrod and pushed upwards that ruddy piston slid straight out of the bore, no rust, no broken rings, it was just stuck in the bore by old fuel or oil drying into the best glue I have ever come across. I could now get on and restore this engine. A fair few of us must regret selling an engine we have worked on and returned to first class order, I know that I regret letting the Victory go, at this time I was very unwell and I got pestered for this engine and I sold it only to find out that it was very soon sold on, oh well that's life - anyone got a seized 1918 5hp Petter Victory going cheap. I still had the apple top, this was a running engine in as found condition and with original paintwork in very good condition, year of manufacture about 1936/37, it had a mechanical lubricator and was mounted on skids. A year or two had passed and I got to know of another apple top a lot older and in need of a good home. It's owner would never name a price, well I was exhibiting at the Selwood Rally at Longleat and got into conversation with the chap next to me in the engine line, he wanted an apple top, in fact I think he would have paid anything to get one. The engine I had was stripped for storage, flywheels removed, magneto removed, lubricator taken of etc. I have burned the midnight oil many timed but never have I rebuilt a Petter, mounted it onto its skids, made a new lubricator drive and had the engine running in about 7 hours, I then loaded it into the van to take to Longleat the next morning. With eyes held open with match sticks I drive back to the rally and into the engine line, before I could get out of the van a voice said 'have you got it?', Yes said I but by this time matey was round the back of the truck, one look, no haggling, a wad of notes was pushed into my hand and I was no longer the owner of a Petter apple top - but not for long, as after the rally I made a detour on my way back to Trowbridge calling on the owner of the much older apple top. 'How much for the apple top?' I asked. Oh I don't know came the reply, so I pulled out some of the money I had from my sale that morning, on seeing money the Petter was soon in the van on its way to a good home and well I did have room in the garage. The Petter turned One engine I did not restore myself but I could not refuse out to be of 1920 vintage with engine No; 51020. when offered was my Bamford 2.5hp, open crank tulip top. Now if you have engines one gets wanting something for them to drive, this I mentioned to a fellow club member that I would like to get something for my engines to drive, I have just the thing a corn mill was the reply I don't want it, so at the next club meeting the mill changed hands, it was in kit form but a good clean, repaint and some new parts tat I made I made the mill was up and running, that is all but the wooden hopper, that was to be made from oak. Me and wood don't mix and I never want to try and make another and if I do we have a good carpenter on the committee. I have had many ups and downs with this hobby but I would not change it, I have had many good timed as a member of the W.S.E.C. and I try in my own way to give a little back as a Committee member. I do have a few more tales to tell and I will do so in the future. I have just remembered the Lister 2.5hp B type that came from Hulavington, it's lying in the back of the garage. I must get that restored, it wants a fair bit of work, so if anyone has a few hours to spare and does not mind derusting old iron, come on over to Trowbridge, I will make you most welcome. Teas, biscuits and plasters all free.
