

THE BRISTOL & SOUTH GLOUCESTER STATIONARY ENGINE CLUB NEW YEAR CRANK-UP AT FROG LANE FARM COALPIT HEATH MONDAY 2nd JANUARY 2006

The farmyard setting for this annual Crank-up could not have been a more natural location as many of the exhibits on display would have spent their working lives in just such a place. Positioned neatly just underneath a vast barn entrance several stationary engines ran in unison, these included a 5hp Victoria, a few Listers, a United and an Amanco. I took along my Kyko Hot Air Fan, although not really a stationary engine it causes some interest on how it works, also there was an unusual Wolseley of about 5 hp, it had twin solid flywheels and a nice external governor that controlled it's inlet valve. It's owner told me he had only purchased it at a sale a few days ago and it needed a lot of tidying up, and to bring it along to the crank-up he installed a temporary fuel tank, retimed the ignition and made a few more adjustments to bring it back to life. Just across the farmyard was a nice display of vehicles including three immaculately restored Land rovers and several vintage cars. After my arrival here, unloading and setting up, I was directed to the refreshment bar where club ladies Annette and Carol provided a piping hot cup of tea and a huge jaw stretching bacon bap, just the thing to get you going on a sunny frosty morning. The refreshment barn was also home to a huge and exciting restoration project in the form of a 47hp spring injection, open crank Blackstone engine which was once the emergency power supplier at a Bristol police Station. This project is about half way completed with a newly fabricated low loader trailer that is hydraulically raised and lowered, the engine block and outrigger bearing is now in-situ, painted and beautifully lined out. The 7ft flywheel which must weigh 3 or 4 tons is standing in a temporary RSJ frame, again all nicely painted and ready to be craned into its crank position. The engine cooling was originally by three 200 gallon water tanks, but for obvious reasons will not be used on the trailer, instead cooling will probably be by old style cast iron radiators. Yet to be restored is the giant 7ft air tank that is required for starting and the huge 35 KVA 3 phase alternator that is driven by 7 V belts. The alternator was made by Lancashire Crypto of Manchester. I think there is still a years worth of work to complete this project and when it's done it will be a real eye catcher and a credit to its owner who has the skills and courage to take on such a restoration. My time spent here was thoroughly enjoyed. Thanks to the club for inviting me. ROBIN

Some time ago Fred Biggs donated some tools to the club, Tony Davis restored and sharpened these tools and has been selling then at the crank ups for club funds. At the last crank up at Nunney Tony raised the sum of £20. Well done Fred and Tony, the work you both do for the club is really appreciated.

Back in early December, Eileen and I decided to "Go Foreign" and visit the South Somerset Club Crank-Up at West Monkton. The attraction was threefold. Eileen wanted to go to Monkton Elm Garden Centre, in search of Christmas presents. I wanted to see the engines, and we both wanted lunch in the pub where the event is held. The morning dawned cold and wet, so it was only the thought that, "it must be better the other side of the Mendips", that persuaded us that it was worth going. As we approached Taunton, the rain eased and had just about stopped as we arrived at the site, which is the car park of the village pub. This is a nice little rally, only a dozen or so engines, plus a couple of Fordson tractors. What it lacks in size it makes up in friendliness and accessibility. It is easy to study the exhibits in detail and chat to the owners at length. There were the usual Lister D's, one of which was running a 1932 sludge pump – a very useful looking bit of kit. A Ruston and Hornsby 6 ½ PB was running very smoothly and unobtrusively, an engine I could watch all day. The engine that I coveted most however was the inverted vertical Benz of 1889. I have seen it before a couple of times. After a few problems when it was first obtained it now runs like the proverbial Swiss Watch. It ran all day, with only an occasional stop for refuelling. It was partnered by a model side shaft hot bulb engine less than a foot long. This delightful engine looked typical of German toys of the early 20th century. I look forward very much to seeing it run one day. Other engines present included a Fairbanks Morse Z type, a Petter Handyman (circa 1910) an Amanco Hired Man of 1914, a Petter type A, and a Ruston B3 driving a Lister pump. The last item was rather intriguing, a TW1 Combo model KOA5 diesel of 1993 manufacture. This engine came from China, and was certainly something that I had not seen before. The pub came up to expectations, and I would certainly recommend it to anyone passing that way, who is in need of "refuelling," even if there is no crank up in progress. Monkton Elm garden centre was also a success - I think it cost me less than 2 quid to get out this year! Last year was different. I saw a toy chain saw, which I thought was just right for our three year old grandson, he thought it was great too - until he was dissuaded from trying to shorten the table legs.
