LISTER PETTER TYNDALE RALLY 1993.

The conversation went something like this "Sorry Rob, but I can't remember enough of what was at Speech House to make up a rally report". "That's alright John, how about scribbling something down about this rally for the newsletter then". All I can say is that Rob has an answer to every excuse that I came up with (and probably to some I didn't think of at the time!). So any complaints go to him not me. (It's generally known as passing the buck).

Originally intended as a 'one off' event to raise money for repairs to the church it is now in it's third year and has more than doubled in size. This may be partly due to the fact that there is no other rally on that weekend in the area, but it is well organised from the very beginning. The site is overlooked by the Nibley monument and gives a commanding view of the Severn Vale south towards Bristol.

There were 322 engines booked in over the weekend of which 268 were there on the Sunday. (I know, I counted them!). It would not be fair to pick out any individual engines (bar one) as there were so many excellent examples there. From the Lister factory there were examples of A's, B's, plenty of D's and some J.L.M.N. and P types and some diesels. Petters ranged from M's of various sizes and hopper types to a S type which took a great deal of time and effort to get it to run but perserverance finally paid off.

Other makes present were from Ruston Hornsby, Amanco, Villiers, Bamford, Wolseley, Fairbanks Morse, Delco-Light and a couple of Warwick Eagles. Between the engines present there was plenty of pumping, grinding and generating.

Pride of place had to go to a 1926 Ruston Hornsby VC4 engine. It was installed in the Honister Pass, Cumbria where it drove a 550 volt DC dynamo supplying power to the local slate mines. It worked up to 1973 when it was replaced by modern generators. Although still undergoing restoration it sounded magnificent.

The engines were displayed in sections in the orchard, it was a pleasant change to have some natural shade available, as all tents and caravans (apart from the less mobile members of our hobby, who were all along one hedge) were in the next field.

From the tractor lads we had various Fergusons, Fordsons, Field Marshalls, David Brown Cropmasters, Internationals, a couple of Gunsmiths and a Caterpillar crawler. There was also a double engined Fordson beast whose name I cannot recall and we must not forget the two Lister tractors which were adorning the Lister stand.

The car section produced quite a good display of British vehicles before we were overwhelmed by the products of the Far East. There were gleaming examples from Ford, Austin, Rover etc. etc. ... There was also a small display of American classis gas guzzlers which always seemed to have a crowd of youngsters around them.

The steam section had a small but varied display. There was the sole surviving Gibbons and Robinson, a Fowler BBl ploughing engine and a mixture of Rollers, General Purpose and Showmans from Fowler, Allchin, Ransome Sims and Jefferies, McLaren, Burrell and Marshall. There was a rack saw bench and a thresher in operation.

The Military section put out a good display and the more adventurous were allowed to show off there paces on the steep hill. There was a small display of Heavy Horses along with the usual displays, stalls, small fairground and beer tent with entertainment in the evenings.

The Motor cycles (Brian Verrall should be doing this bit) again had on show examples of a once flourishing industry which didn't react to the tidal wave of Japanese products until it was far too late. There were bikes from BSA, Norton, AJS, Triumph, Douglas, Francis Barnet, Royal Enfield, Vincent, Velocette, DOT, Jawa, Ariel as well as a Vespa, Harley Davidson and a Moto-Guzzi and a couple of Morgan three wheelers. There was also a display from the Vintage Cycle Club. The best thing about the motor cycle section was to hear the sound of the bikes as they went off on their daily impromptu(?) road run.

On the Saturday morning there was a small auction of various bits and pieces, I only stopped to see the first few lots go as space was very limited. A early thirties restored Crossley enclosed crank fetched £130, while a 1927 Lister J (restored) was sold to £124 (I was told afterwards that when it was run there could be heard a rather heavy knock). A 1934 Lister L type, trolley mounted and in original condition which came off the local Lord Ducie's estate reached a reasonable £180 but had a very optimistic £300+ reserve on it. There were a few other interesting items (a couple of D types, a Bristol crawler and a threshing drum to name but a few) but it was getting rather warm and I was fed up being pushed around so I left them to it and decided to go and fire up the A type.

And finally, the weather was perfect. If you're still awake after reading this and weren't there, give it a try it's a good rally (well I think so). Rob reckoned he saw at least thirty club members exhibiting so how about some more next year.

MELLS DAFFODIL FESTIVAL

Easter Bank Holiday - Monday 12th April.

This event seems to be getting more popular than ever with stationary engine exhibitors, as over 40 engines turned up to support this friendly little event, in fact it was a bit tight to find enough room for everyone but with a squeeze up here and there and a few engines tucked in with the motor cycles everyone was catered for.

An unusual event is this as the main theme is for visitors to walk around the village and view the masses of daffodils that have been planted, and hopefully support some of the fund raising activities to raise money for the local church. In recent years (this was the 14th) many of the flowers were past their best as a warm start to the year and quite a lot of sunshine brought the flowers out a bit earlier than usual but what was left was still worth seeing.

The main road through the village is closed on the Monday and filled with stalls of all descriptions, this attracts many thousands of visitors and sometimes its quite hard work making your way through the crowds. Good use is made of a large field next to the church, this houses a small fun-fair, plus stationary engines, motor cycles, more stalls and lots of fund raising activities. At the top of this field the English Civil War Society stages mock battles with blunderbuss' and cannon fire, hundreds of royalists try to slay the Parliamentarians but most survive to fight another day.

A report in the local press described the stationary engines as 'a curious display of old steam engines chuddering away on the grass'. (It was written by a lady obviously not yet initiated into our hobby.) A good cross section of engine manufacturers was represented here and if a prize for being environmentally friendly had been awarded it would have gone to the owner of a little $1\frac{1}{2}$ hp Detroit. I'm sure this engine only fired about six times per minute and having chatted to it's owner I'm certain he said he could attend four rallies on a gallon of petrol!! Economy at its best, no doubt due to some fine tuning on the carburettor plus a little Welsh inginuity.

OPEN DAYS at Blagdon's Victorian Pumping Station are once again to take place and what a good chance to see the huge 1902 giant beam engines, admission is free and the dates are as follows:- Sunday 15th August, Saturday 28th August and Monday 30th August(Bank Holiday) Opening times are 10.00am to 4.00pm.

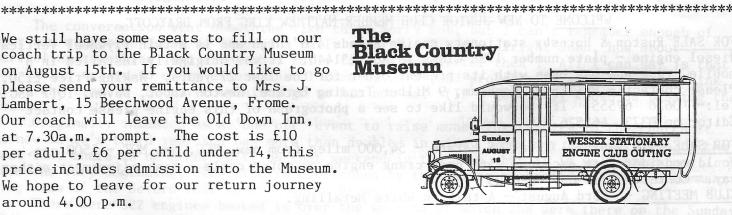
While receiving their plaques quite a few exhibitors, both members and visitors expressed their thanks for an enjoyable event so I hereby pass these on also.
