



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

Well that's the Rally over for this year. The new site at Cheddar was certainly the easiest we have had to set up, because it is much nearer to 'The Workforce' than Semington was, it meant we could do work on setting up during the week instead of leaving everything until the Friday. All we had to do on the Friday was put up all the ropes. We had a good entry in all sections despite clashing with other rallies. The auction attracted over 260 lots including 2 tractors which realised their reserve of £500 each. The new site and the layout seemed to be popular with all the exhibitors but despite more advertising than usual it failed to attract large numbers of the public. This upset the traders who reported poor sales. The administration of the rally especially the pay gate on the Sunday was a real problem mainly due to the boot sale, there will be a lot of discussion at future committee meetings to determine if in fact this site is suitable after all for future rallies. Finally I would like to thank everyone who helped in anyway to set up the rally, carry out numerous duties during the rally or who helped to dismantle everything after the rally. Keith Reader (Sept 1934 to June 1999)

It is with great sorrow that the stationary engine movement mourns the sudden death of Keith Reader on June 11th after a short illness. Keith (known to his many friends as 'Chepstow') was a dedicated rally goer and could be found at engine rallies anywhere all over the country, from Tatton Park in Cheshire to Ardingly in Sussex, or to St Agnes in Cornwall. His last rally was at Abergavenny where, at the age of 64 years, he was enthusiastically filling in his forms for his retirement pension. Keith had worked for many years for the Red & White Bus Company in Chepstow where he was a foreman fitter and thus had acquired a deep knowledge of Gardner diesel engines. He started rallying engines in the early 1970's, his favourite undoubtedly being the 6hp Melco-Brownwall and up to his death he was enjoying his early retirement with the ongoing restoration of a small Ingeco. He was a keen motorcyclist and in later years had graduated on from a BSA to a BMW and was an active member of the BMW club. His sense of humour, cheery smile and hearty laughter by which he was known to his many rallying friends will be a sad loss to the engine rally scene. Our condolences go to his sister and the family. ### \*\*\*\* ANNUAL CLUB RALLY - 19/20TH JUNE AT WINCHESTER FARM, CHEDDAR \*\*\*\*\*

A 40 mile move in a westerly direction was to be our venue this year, from last years site at Semington to a new site at Cheddar. Many Club members have fond memories of several years ago when we were at Cheddar Football ground and this years site was only a few fields away from the old pitch. Jackie, Bill, Marg and myself arrived quite early on Friday morning to find a lot of exhibitors had beaten us to it and most of the field was already set up with fence posts and pegs marking out where everything was going, a lot of this work was done on previous evenings during that week which must have taken a lot of pressure off having to do it all on the Friday morning. The very hot weather on Friday brought exhibitors in droves and I would say that two thirds were in place by Friday evening, which is fine as it elevates congestion on Saturday morning. Not many engines were running on Saturday morning as their owners were attending 'The Auction' and our Chairman Brian in his best auctioneers patter began to sell some 252 lots, he was assisted by Mary Phillips and Norman Finnamore and had athletic Colin Curtis as runner to take completed auction sheets back to Jackie and Mary Butler for processing. The auction took 3.5 hours which must have been a strain on Brians voice. After lunch the stationary engines came to life and what a great collection. Brian Reed should have a medal for bringing not one but four Bristol Wagon & Carriage Works Victoria's, which took two journeys from Churchill to site and all the loading and off loading, you certainly did a good job Brian, but we haven't finished yet, next to Brian were six Amancos which ranged from sizes 1 3/4 hp to 9hp and were all owned by the same person. I'm sorry I don't know his name but it was a wonderful display. Lines of tractors, cars, motor bikes and commercials all looked splendid in their sections and were to do their stuff around the ring under the directions of ring master Brian Verrall. Our special guest on Saturday morning was the Lady Mayor of Axbridge accompanied by her deputy and on arrival was presented with a bouquet of flowers by Kate Nicholson, they spent an hour being chaperoned around the field by Robin and safety officer Alan Carney who took some photographs. 'Old Henry' - I say old as he is getting on a bit now but still doing a great job of hauling the water cart along with man servant and owner Brian Lovell. This trusty old Fordson tractor did a stirling job over the weekend keeping all engines supplied with coolant - thank you Brian. Jim and Carol Coxhead had their juvenile funfair at the lower end of the field to keep the little ones happy whilst Mum and Dad viewed the exhibits. I estimated around 200 people gathered either inside or out of here for an evening of Country and Western by 'Bitter Creek' a popular singer that we have had before. At the interval it was time to present the awards judges by our good friends from the Dorset Club - Dan and Steve. Best Vertical Engine - Lister L type owned by Edwards Carp Senior, Best Horizontal Engine - National owned by Ed Thorne. Best Working Engine - Wolseley & Shearing Outfit owner by Norman Finnamore, Best in Show -Ruston Hornsby owned by Brian Taylor, Best Junior - Lister 'D' owned by Kate Nicholson. A special well done to Katie as she is the first young lady to win this award and will have her name engraved on the junior shield. The raffle was the next thing to take place with some 40 prizes on the table, Linda and Carol had been around the field all day selling tickets and had done a tremendous job looking at the amount of tickets in the revolving drum, with the aid of Brian, Colin and Linda I sped through the raffle fairly quickly and our entertainment resumed. A special thank you to all who bought raffle prizes, this is always a big help and much appreciated. Another raffle took place on Sunday with Linda, Hazel and Brian doing the rounds, and my good lady was fortunate to win two tickets to a concert on Wells Cathedral Green.
