
### \*\*\*\*\* HINTS AND TIPS \*\*\*\*\*

He states that if fitted it reduces the efficiency of the spark, sometimes to the extent the engine will not run. 
SMALL POWER ENGINES BY TOM RANDALL

Having seen an increasing number of small power engines, mostly of unknown make, putting in appearances on the rally field this year I thought it may be interesting to many and perhaps even helpful to some if I were to share through the newsletter a substantial amount of information on and illustrations of small power engines which were featured and advertised in the MODEL ENGINEER & ELECTRICIAN magazine between the years 1900 and 1916. I have recently acquired an incomplete but none-the-less substantial run of this weekly journal between these dates and they are yielding up a storehouse of advertisements, pictures and articles on many makes of engines. M.E. & E. was founded in 1898 as model engineering was entering its hey-day and small power gas and oil engines served both as a model engineering exercise and subsequently as a much needed source of power for lathes and lighting etc., in model engineers' workshops. Model engineers then, as today, were justifiably proud of their workshops and M.E. & E. features workshops of which many of us today would be envious. A small gas, oil or steam engine would be installed to power a range of machinery through line shafting & belting which in some photographs seem to leave hardly any room for the man himself. Out of such places came an infinite variety of models, from steam yachts to benzoline powered roller skates! There were dozens of commercially produced small engines, available either in kit form or complete. There were also many totally freelance engines being built, some from original detailed designs for which patterns were made and castings produced as one-offs, to engines made for as low a cost as possible from scrap odds and ends. I hope to show you many of these, including the world's smallest working steam engine of that time, shown in the photograph alongside a common house-fly for size comparison, Which was larger? Wait and see! I have recklessly promised our desperate newsletter editor an article each month, so by way of an introduction, here are a few pictures hopefully to whet your appetites. An engine with which we are already familiar is the ROBINSON'S HR engine, shown here in its original design as a hot tube ignition gas engine. From the same issue in 1903 is this local advert, unfortunately not illustrated, for a horizontal engine, presumably a mill style steam engine, from GEORGE GOODMAN & CO, of EAST HAYES, BATH. Does anyone know anything about this company?

Finally, a tantalising advert from the BRITISH ENGIN-EERING & ELECTRICAL CO. of LEEK, STAFFORDSHIRE, (yes LEEK!) who issued this ad. in 1912 to readers of The CAPTAIN magazine informing them about the non-availability of their engines, so they covered up the picture. However, all will be revealed next time when we will be taking a more detailed look at LEEK engines.

\*\*\*\*\* WESSEX STATIONARY ENGINE CLUB'S SPRING COACH TRIP \*\*\*\*\*

On Sunday 26th April about thirty Wessex members visited Ed Bolton's Open Day at Amersham, Bucks. The coach left the Old Down car park sharp at the advertised time of 8.30, we then headed for Frome to pick up passengers, then on to Trowbridge for the final pick up point. Then it was on to Hungerford where we headed for the motorway and on to Reading Services for breakfast. I certainly felt better after a nice cooked breakfast. We arrived at Ed Boltons, which is an old farm yard, to find his 'Open Day' well under way, with loads of visitors already there. It certainly turned a few heads when our very large coach drove up the very narrow lane to gain access, it was to large to go in the usual car park, but the friendly farmer next to Ed's let us park in his yard. Ed has a very large private collection of engines all installed in buildings, and all in running order. On his open days he has to recruit the services of about twenty local enthusiasts to attend to the exhibits that are running, as well as all the engines installed in the buildings quite a few engines were running outside, Also outside were three steamers all fired up and in steam, one was a Clayton and Shuttleworth traction engine, and a Clayton portable and a Richard Hornsby portable. An engine inside that I would have liked to have brought back with me was a Crossley Slide Valve Gas Engine, circa 1879, reputed to be the first 4 cycle engine to be sold in this country, there were plenty of engines for sale including some very large ones priced at £3 - £4,000 each. A few autojumble stalls were set up selling everything from spares to complete engines, also Wessex member Patrick Knight was doing a good trade with his book stand. After several laps around the engines and a couple of visits to the tea shop it was 3.30 and time to depart. After a quick visit in the motorway services we arrived back at the Old Down at about 6.30. I thought the day out was really good, its not very often we can find somewhere to go connected with our hobby. B.J.B.
