What a pleasant surprise this meeting turned out to be, the club room was packed to

capacity, please keep this up for the rest of the year.

After a couple of announcements I introduced our guest speaker for the evening, retired prison officer Mr. Francis J. Disney, B.E.M., prison historian and author from Shepton Mallet, where he had spent the last 15 years of his service at Shepton Mallet Jail, the oldest jail in the country still in use. The jail is over 300 years old and in days gone by was a very grim place to be in. The jail had a corn mill, this was driven by a treadmill which was powered by forty convicts at any one time, beatings and deaths were commonplace. Harsh severe sentences were the order of the day, one 18 year old was sentenced to 6 months hard labour followed by deportation from the country for stealing two cows tails from a local butcher. (Todays judges please take note).

After the defeat of the Monmouth Rebellion in 1685 many Sheptonians who had been in sympathy with the Duke fled for their lives, Judge Jefferies held his infamous assizes and he sentenced 12 men to be hung drawn and quartered in Shepton Mallet Market Place, their heads were impaled on poles and displayed around various parts of the town (nowadays they would have been sent on Safari holidays). Mr. Disney gave a detailed talk on the prison history from the time it was built until the present day, a very comprehensive book he has

written and had published took over five years to research.

In 1930 the prison was closed due to a reclining population in the area, a prison designed for 150 inmates now only had about 30. It stayed closed until 1939 when it re-opened at the outbreak of war as a military prison, throughout the entire British Army Shepton Mallet 'glasshouse' was feared by one and all, its purpose was to be so 'intolerable' that know one would want to return. In 1942 the prison was transferred to the American Army during their occupation a lot of Americans mainly black people were executed by hanging or shooting for crimes ranging from rape to murder or desertion.

During the war the prison housed some of the nations treasures including the Doomsday Book and the Magna Carta. It was rumoured the crown jewels also were there, this has never been confirmed or denied. After the war the prison was again taken over by the British Army and in May 1960 the prison was once more returned to a civil prison run by the prison service. Part of Mr. Disneys talk and presentation was two long tables which he proceeded to cover with items he took from two brief cases, I assisted him with one table and Bob Hallam with the other. On one table he displayed items and goods made in the prison workshops to keep the inmates gainfully employed, these consisted of plastic goods made in modern plastic injection machines, some of these were made under contract to firms like M. & S., Harrods etc., toothbrushes, carrier bags, beakers, combs, pens etc. — How he managed to get so much out of one case was amazing. The other table was covered by illegal goods made by the prisoners, rope ladders, pipes for smoking drugs, knives etc. another table full from one case — amazing.

Mr. Disney was thanked for his excellent presentation and then he invited questions from the audience. He then invited anyone to purchase copies of his superb book, the profits of which go to the Dorothy House Foundation. In 1991 Mr. Disney was awarded the B.E.M. in the Queens New Years honours list for fund raising and public relations. The raffle followed a short break for glasses to be filled and the meeting ended around 10 o'clock.

### CLUB VISIT TO RADSTOCK & DISTRICT MUSEUM - Sunday 9th April.

This visit was arranged by the committee as a result of a talk on the Museum earlier in the year at one of our club nights. I was more than disappointed when only eleven members turned up for this visit, where the h..l were the rest of you.

The Museum is situated just outside Radstock at Haydon, the site must have been a farm years ago as the exhibits are displayed in a converted cow stall. Before the Somerset Coal fields closed down, mining was the main source of employment in this area and a great number of exhibits were relics from this once great industry, there was even a mock coal face and tunnel we could walk through. A replica of a miners cottage made one appreciate all the modern conveniences the modern housewife has at her disposal. I saw a couple of Lister 'D's abandoned outside together with quite a collection of old farm implements and mining equipment. Inside was a Lister 'L' dated 1914 and sold when new to a blacksmith in Midsomer Norton, this engine is on loan from Wessex member Tom Randall.

On the lawn outside was a troupe of clog dancers performing 'The Beetle Crushers' from Wells, they had a good audience and certainly put on a good performance dancing to the music of a piano accordian.

An Easter Fayre was held in the house adjoining the museum, this had various goods for sale including some delicious looking home made cakes, a display of antique glassware attracted quite a large audience as the owner gave a detailed talk on the subject. Teas and refreshments were on sale, most of us bought tea and took it outside to sit in the sun, very tranquil and enjoyable. By now it was four o'clock and time to depart (yes all eleven of us!!!!) all in all it has been a very interesting and enjoyable afternoon and I would recommend anyone to visit and see for themselves.


