**** FOREST OF DEAN STEAM RALLY - SUNDAY 20TH OCTOBER 1996 ****


On October 20th Brian and myself left Shepton Mallet at 7 a.m. en route to the Norchard Railway steam rally at Norchard, Nr. Lydney. Arriving at about 8.15 a.m. after a very quiet traffic free journey (the Old Severn Bridge was completely deserted) we soon saw many familiar faces, many from Wessex Stationary Club. This is a particularly nice well arranged rally, a real credit to George Locker, John White and their army of willing workers. The rally is centred around the Norchard Steam Preservation Companys centre, this was built from scratch some years ago on a completely vacant site, to see it today you would think it was an original station of many years, it consists of booking offices, large workshop and many other small buildings with many items of rolling stock and railway artifacts scattered around some of the rolling stock are in various stages of preservation. The entry to the rally entitles you to ride on the trains on the couple of miles of track that they have restored so far, more is to be made available as time and money permits, we had a ride on a D.M.U. diesel then on a steam loco. The rally itself caters for various enthusiasts with a very large display of coaches and buses, many classic cars, motorcycles, tractors, steam engines, commercial vehicles and of course stationary engines. Later in the afternoon when the various awards were presented by the Mayor of Lydney, quite a few were won by Wessex members. The rally organisers award presented by George Locker was won this year by a group of people that has done much work from the inception of the rally in setting up the ropes etc they were Roy Cox, Ivor Cox, Don Rogers, Reg Butler and Roger Pike. In the stationary engines section Highly Commendable were won by Roger Pike with his Stuart Lighting Set and Brian Baker with his $4\frac{1}{2}$ hp Ruston. Love at first sight



It was love at first sight when Eric Brain bought his first car an Austin 7. No sooner had he sold it in order to buy something a little more modern than he yearned to be behind the Austin 7 wheel once again. So he bought another one in Exeter in 1963 and spent two years restoring it. Today, ten years later, it is running as smoothly as the day it left the Austin factory in 1930. Eric who joined the MST as an apprentice in 1959, today is Chargehand in the Assembly

Shop. In his spare time he has stripped the Austin completely and now he knows it inside "One thing I didn't change was the upholstery", he told The Thrissell. "It is a moquette with a black and white check design, it is unusual to find a car which still has it these days". Normally the Austin is used by Eric's wife Ann, who gave the car its name, 'Myrtle'. ("Because the sound of the engine is 'myrtle-myrtle-myrtle'" explains Eric.) But at Weekends Eric, a member of the Bristol Austin 7 Club, takes Myrtle rallying and to other motoring events at Beaulieu and Longleat, where she has won prizes and cups. And she took part in a special three-day rally which marked the 50th anniversary of the Austin 7 Club. Myrtle seems to thrive on long journeys. "I've been to Cornwall twice and she has gone up some of the steepest hills in the West Country, including Lynmouth and Porlock", "She has even bumped over the rough tracks on Dunkery Beacon quite happily". Eric's interest in cars and engine started in 1959 when he learnt to drive - on a lorry. At present he is busy restoring a 1930 Morris Minor. From time to time he restores vintage agricultural engines which he takes to traction engine rallies where they compete in a class of their own. Eric's oldest agricultural engine dates back to 1918. Surprisingly, spare parts for vintage cars are easier to obtain than those for Eric's modern MG Midget. "Manufacturers make spares and tyres for vintage cars periodically and when a part is required it is ready and waiting", said Eric.
