# MONDAY OCTOBER 28th. CLUB NIGHT AT THE OLD DOWN INN.

When I arrived At the Old Down Inn at around 7-30 it was almost standing room only, I counted 54 members present and still they came. The evenings entertainment was going to be a talk and slide show by by our past President and founder member of the Wessex Stationary Engine Club, Eric Brain. We did not have a clue what Eric was going to talk about, and I guess that like myself, most of those present thought it was going to be about our hobby of stationary engines. Well it was in some ways, for Eric gave us an insight into his work at the engineering department of Bath University. Well I wish I could turn the clock back and have the chance to study and receive training at such a place as Bath University. For what Eric showed us and talked about had me spellbound, it really was a great insight into what takes place at a university with such a high grade engineering department as Bath. Eric started work at the university after being made redundant from his previous job, he answered an advert in the local paper and hey presto, he had a job at the engineering department of the university. I think it may have been the lure of the chance to work on steam plant that attracted him in the first place, but he told me this type of work did not last for long, but he did get to work on a steam plant for place, but he told me this type of work did not last for long, but he did get to work on a steam plant for Moultons of Bradford-on-Avon, the makers of the famous Moulton bicycle. In the field of internal combustion engines, work ranged over a great many different types, from Coventry Climax through to Honda. One engine that Eric showed was most interesting, this could be run as a petrol engine with magneto ignition or as a diesel, in both forms the engine had a variable compression that could be altered at will. We saw how the engines were mounted onto the test beds and run against a load, the load being applied in most cases by a water brake dynamometre. On some engines an electric brake was used but it would seem to me that the water brake was more efficient. Mid evening we had our usual raffel with a tremendous range of prizes, and when this was over and many a glass refilled, Eric moved on to show us the work carried out by students, this ranged over many different fields of automotive engineering. The work carried out for the Ford Motor Company alone is quite an eye opener, this covered the testing of engines for fuel efficency, oil pressure, heat distribution, induction pressures, and exhaust emissions etc, and all this carried out at different speeds and loads. The students at Bath have not only carried out testing of engines, but have designed and built engines for the Ford Motor Company. On notable example being a diesel engine for the Ford Transit van, this being constructed from four engines supplied by Ford. These were then cut in two and rebuilt in a different form so that the friction was greatly reduced. This was achieved by designing a "V" shaped crank shaft, all the design, machining, assembly work, right through to the running and testing is carried out by the students. The motor cycle industry also uses the services of Bath University, look out Honda, I have heard that Kawasaki engines are better than yours. Now I for one would like a job where I got a chance to go racing, well that's what happens in the engineering department of Bath University. Yes they do, they not only go racing, but they design and build the cars, right through from the body shell, chassis, suspension, steering and other items. The engine is limited to 600cc, but this can still reach 140mph in unrestricted form, but the engine is restricted by limiting the induction intake size to 20mm, therfore speed must be found in other ways, lack of friction being one, and aerodynamics another way to gain speed over the rest of the competitors. Bath did very well on their first attempt, they finished 12<sup>th</sup>, not bad for ones first outing. If the car that has been built for the coming year goes as well it looks as though it will be a winner. This type of racing started guess where? Yes that's right, in the USA, but its not just a fun thing, it is very serious engineering and is backed by industry with sponsorship coming from type companies and others. is very serious engineering and is backed by industry with sponsorship coming from tyre companies and others, so what is learned on the track and in the classroom can be put to good use by the automotive industry. Going back to my beloved motorcycles, a MZ motor cycle was fitted with a Robin diesel single cylinder engine at Bath, this was ridden by one of the instructors at the university and he was thrilled with it, not a fast motorcycle, but it would go up any hill, and one never had to change gear, it would pull a house down. They also take part in another type of competitive engineering at Bath and this is their Eco Car, this is again powered by a Robin diesel, and has achieved 1,117 on one gallon of fuel, Bath university has won this event no less than six times in succession, that can't be bad. Now most of the students stay at the university for five years, four in the classroom and one out in the industry itself, with 95% of the students having a job to go to before they leave. One thing that Eric told us was that girl students were better than the boys, "women better than men I just can't believe it". I now know more than I did about the workings of a university, I just wish I was young again and

Well the evening came to an end, but I guess like me, other members at the meeting would love to see some of the projects undertaken in the flesh, I for one would like to see the rotary piston engine built by one of the students to a design by the great Phil Vincent, (maker of the Vincent motorcycle). I would like to thank Eric for a wonderful evenings entertainment, not only from myself, but the members and committee of the Wessex thank you very much for a great evening's entertainment.

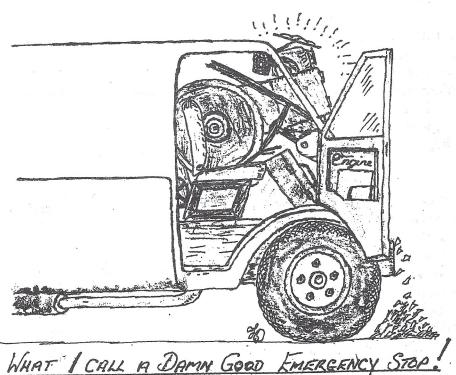
