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RESTORATION OF A GODWIN WATER PUMP

In response to an advert in these pages, myself and my neighbour Dave found ourselves travelling to Weston-Super-Mare; Lister pump for sale was all it said. I had been looking for some time for a load for my 1926 Lister A-type to drive.

We soon found the house and were shown the pump, not a Lister at all but a Godwin OH I twin cylinder double acting pump. Fort some reason I expected to find it all in one piece but was actually presented with in in two boxes of bits! Well, it was all there, always a good start. The crank shaft bearings had both seized and damaged the shaft. The big-end shells were missing (more of this later!) and the big and small ends of the con rods were all oval. However, the valves, cross-heads and pistons were all OK.

Having agreed on a price, we returned home to Bath with our prize and the next evening began a more thorough inspection. Nothing seemed to be beyond repair until a closer look at the cast-iron cylinder block revealed a crack in the body with traces of some inexpert welding having been carried out. A bit of poking with a tyre lever resulted in the whole corner of the block breaking away. Now what...!

If all else had failed I reckoned that I could jam the valves shut to that half of the cylinder to prevent any water getting in and make a cosmetic repair only to the cast iron, thus running the pump on a single cylinder only. Having thus established a possible way out of trouble I embarked upon a more positive approach of permanent repair to full working order. A few phone calls established that commercial welding or stitching was prohibitably expensive and that to use electric arc-welder was the solution. Special cast-iron rods are required for this kind of work and these were eventually tracked down to a demolition and reclaimation firm called Walcot Reclaimation, Walcot Street, Bath; they will sell you rods at about 40p each if you persist, they use them to repair cast-iron fire places. My limited researches into cast-iron welding revealed that in order to prevent stress cracks occurring, preheating of the job and slow cooling after the weld were necessary. Dave and I built a concrete block oven on the shed floor with fire bars half way up and three paraffin primus stoves underneath them. The casting and its broken pieces had all the edges ground to about 45 degrees to half the thickness of the material; this is most important as it allows full penetration of the weld. Also a jig was constructed from scrap metal to hold the pieces in situ until firmly tacked, using existing holes in the casting. We placed the casting on the fire bars in the oven and retired for coffee for about an hour when it seemed to be as hot as it was going to get. Welding commenced and proceeded as normal except that the rods seemed to get very hot resulting in the electrode holder melting. In most places, two passes of weld seemed to be required. On completion, the whole thing was wrapped in rags and left to cool slowly, peining with a hammer occasionally to stress relieve it, taking several hours to finally cool.

After grinding and filling, the weld was invisible; the only giveaway is where the crack went through a stud hole. I redrilled and tapped the hole farther around the flange, the studs now have an odd spacing.

The crank-shaft, damaged by a seized ball-race, was turned down from 1" to 7/8 and then a bush made and Locktited to the shaft thus bringing it up to the original diameter. New ballraces were fitted. Dave kindly machined out the con-rod bid ends, made shells and small end bushes for me. The shells were made slightly oversize and then hand fitted to the journals using a file and engineer's blue. The journals were worn oval and thus hand fitting enabled the removal of most of the wear.

Requiring new leather cup-washers, I called at the Godwin Factory at Quenington near Cirencester; the storeman was most helpful and had all I wanted. The OH series of pumps are still in

2. production in a modified form though most parts are common with the earlier versions. Whilst talking to one of the fitters there I discovered that the big-ends do not have shells - the crankshaft journals run directly in the con-rods which are of bronze, what I had thought were missing shells was in fact 1/16" wear!

The whole pump was then painted with primer and several coats of Humbrol enamel and then reassembled using new paper and rubber gaskets. The great day finally came for a test run using an electric motor. All went well, the pump delivering a smooth flow with just a slight leak from one part

of the welded repair; this was repaired with epoxy resin on the inside of the block.

My pump was originally coupled to a Lister A-type in a pump house on a Wiltshire country estate, the engine was apparently dated at 1948. The restoration has had several outings to rallys this year, and the next project? a smaller Lister Domestic pump with similar bearing troubles, bent crankshaft and broken cast-iron con-rod!

N.V.T. & E. C, (North Somerset Group) PLOUGHING MATCH & RALLY

In the engine section, Brian Munt and Phil Harris gave a sawing demonstration using Brian's 1940 Avon Dragsaw and Phil's 1910 bandsaw made by Orme of London and driven by Phil Harris' Wolseley.

The engines and static tractors were judged during the day, the winners being as follows:

1st, Mr. W. Speake with a 1935 Lister; 2nd, Bill Appleby - 1936 Ruston Hornsby; 3rd Brian Munt - 1940 Avon Dragsaw. The tractor prizes went to 1st, Hector Hamer - 1949 Fordson Major; 2nd, Rueben Smith - Standard Fordson; 3rd, J. Stevens - 1947 John Deere.

The CLIC Stall organised by Eileen Maybee and Evelyn Cox raised £44.33 and although very few

public attended this event, I'm certain that all who took part thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

The Wessex Stationary Engine Club was one of the first, if not THE first, club to offer a Public Liability Insurance Scheme. At that time we were a mere hundred or so members and we offered it as a service extra to the annual subscription. Eventually we did a deal with an insurance group to cover any member with any engine, on or off the rallyfield and including most types of ancillary equipment except pressure vessels or circular saws against third party liability. This cover also indemnified the Club itself. Other Clubs soon followed suit and eventually, since most other Clubs catered for tractors, etc. we were forced to increase the cover from £250.000 to £500.000 as this was the minimum figure required by most rallies. We had ensured that ALL paid-up members were covered by this scheme, except Junior Members who were unfortunately outside the scope of the policy.

The Club has always been conscious that safety and safeguarding its member's interests are paramount; thus in the event of any claim, either against the Club or individual members, the only insurance to have <u>must be the VERY BEST</u>. In the light of the fact that we now have some 240 members and that this figure tends to increase annually, we have taken professional advice on our present policy and are currently involved in ways of improving it which may even result in changing our insurers and even re-constructing the present subscription system at renewal date.
