The Rallies? South Somersets Yesterdays Farming and Richard Pococks Berwick St. John's Country Fayre. I have had members ring me up in the past asking if they could bring guests along to our meetings and events. We have discussed this in committee and decided guests would be welcome to attend any meeting or event organised by the Wessex Club, hopefully they may then decide to join our Club.

BERWICK ST. JOHN COUNTRY FAYRE - SAT/SUN SEPT 14th/15th.

On Saturday September 14th Brian and myself loaded two engines and set off for Mr. Richard Pococks rally situated at Berwick St. John, this rally is held on a very nice site and the weather was absolutely beautiful. The stationary line contained about a hundred and ten engines with a few Wessex members present, Robin Lambert and Bill Appleby and Edward and Gloria Carp to name a few, Brian Lovell was doing his usual duty with the water bowser. There was a large working area containing many exhibits such as four thrashing machines and balers and elevators, a large racksaw driven by a steam engine, also a bandsaw, racksaw, a stone crusher, a miniature steam engine driving a very nicely made baler, all of these exhibits were working most of the day. A very large selection of tractors was on display, some of which was engaged in ploughing during the weekend, also in the tractor section was a block of about 40 tractors of various ages and nationalities, mostly for sale, these belong to Mr. Pocock. At the farm end of the site there were many derelict tractors belonging to Mr. Pocock.

With this site situated in the rolling countryside this provided two steep hilly fields which were used for tractor and steam ploughing. The rally attracted a great many exhibitors and side shows including, the stone mason, blacksmith, thatcher, Dick Apps with his pole lathe, terrier racing, sheep dogs working, vintage cars, motorcycles and commercial vehicles, gypsy caravans, a flower show and handicraft tent, besides lots of trade stands selling various goods. Lofty and Jen Coles were in attendance keeping very busy with their bread oven, Lofty drives the flour mill with a portable steam engine. This rally is held every two years, (this year the money raised was for a childrens hospice). It is certainly one of the best rallies I have attended this year, it was very well supported by very large crowds of general public on both days. Edward and Gloria are comparative newcomers to the engine rally world and have been Wessex Stationary Engine Club Ltd. members for four years. Nevertheless, they have quickly integrated into the Club and together play a large part in its success.

Consequently they can be found at such rallies as Yesterday's Farming, Sedgemoor, Honiton Hill, Countryside Cavalcade (where the Lister has won awards), Semington, Berwick St. John, Backwell and the many small one day 'Crank-Ups'. The interest in engines has also rubbed off in the family as son Edward Junior often accompanies them to rallies with his Lister 'A' - type. The family do not mind the travelling to rallies, even going some distance if it is a rally they enjoy and look forward to. They like rallies where they can park behind their engine and deplore the "lawn mower engine with support staff of twenty hangers-on" syndrome which is becoming altogether to prevalent these days.

Edward has twenty engines in his collection which includes Ruston PB, Wolseley, Amanco, Armstrong Siddeley diesel, Lister CS and Petter to name but a few. However the 1924 Lister 'L' - type remains a firm favourite as it starts easily and runs all day with no attention needed. Having a well set-up workshop with many facilities has enabled Edward to do most of his own restoration but he commends Brian Baker for the painting tips in the Newsletter which was great help to him. Although he says they have no other hobbies, Edward and Gloria enjoy a game of skittles, with Gloria just failing to win the play-off in a Club skittle match last year. Over recent months, Gloria has taken on the selling of raffle tickets at the Club meetings and Crank-Ups and seems to have exceptional powers of persuasion when pockets need to be emptied of small change! They both worked hard at the Semington Rally this year, not only setting up but staying on to help taking down and tidying up after the event.

# THE WESSEX MODEL & TOY COLLECTORS CLUB VISIT TO "THE FFESTINIOG RAILWAY" ON SEPTEMBER 15TH 1996.

Leaving Trowbridge at 6 am and heading for the M5 & M6 then the M54 to Telford, Shrewsbury, Oswestry, Bala, we arrived at the slate town of Blaenau Ffestiniog at 11.30 am. First impressions are rather grey, Blaunau is officially not part of Snowdonia and the hillsides surrounding the town look bleak, with their mounds of slate, pieces deemed inferior after being won from the ground by generation after generation of miners. But its history which makes the town worth visiting.


It has two excellent slate mining museums. Glodafa Gonol and Llechwedd. Wechwedd's two underground tours should keep all the family enthralled. Bathed in coloured lights, the cathedral - like underground caverns - hacked out over 100 years ago by men who saw

little daylight throughout their grim lives are absolutely stunning.

Welsh mines, such as those at Blaenau, might have given us some ugly hillsides, but they did leave a far more tourist friendly legacy — in the shape of the Great Little Trains of Wales, once used for pulling rock to the main line and on to the shipyards. On narrow gauge tracks, these pint—sized trains clank and scuttle down the valleys from the pit heads to the sea. After the mines closed many fell into disrepair but, thankfully, the tourist industry has caused some of the best to thrive again, including of course, the Ffestiniog Railway that runs for  $13\frac{1}{2}$ miles through tranquil pastures and forests, past lakes and water—falls, round horseshoe bends and even round a complete spiral, sometimes clinging to the mountainside, sometimes tunnelling through it and then along the coastline to Portmadoc.. 70 minutes of sheer delight. Portmadoc is an attractive, busy, little town situated on the coast with the magnificent backdrop of the Snowdonia Mountain range. Its back on the coach again heading south to Newtown, Builth Wells, Abergavenny, M4 over the new bridge again, Bath and arriving at Trowbridge at 11.00 pm. 500 miles in 17 hours. Yes it was a long day but I would do it again.

# MOUNTING POSITIONS FOR TRAILER REAR LAMPS AND REFLECTORS



Trailers over 1.3m wide require a rear fog guard lamp. This should be mounted to the offside of the centre line of the trailer. Other lamps and reflectors should be isometrically mounted. The above information is given as a guide only for full details consult 'The Road Vehicles Lighting Regulations'.
