

Cider & Cheese at Woodlands Farm Sat 6th Oct By Herb and Wendy Gane

Some 25 members of the Wessex club gathered on a lovely bright evening at Woodlands Farm. We were greeted by Kevin House, his uncle Trevor House, and the two Jack Russell puppies. The meeting started at 6.30 and after introductions we walked to the nearby orchard where Kevin told us all about the various apple varieties and the history of the orchard. They have about 20 acres of orchards and supply apples to Rich's cider, as well as using them to make cider for their own use.

The orchards were planted between forty and a hundred years ago, though they have recently started a re-planting programme to replace the diseased or missing trees. They use mainly early fruiting varieties such as Morgan Sweets and Buttery Does. Older late fruiting varieties such as Doves, Dabennet, Somerset Redstreak, Yarlington Mill, Balmer Normal Laurel Drains, Blue Sweets and Ellis Bitter are less commonly used.


Kevin explained how the weather plays an important part in determining the yield, as do the bees for pollination. Apples are mostly picked up by a machine which we later saw in the barn. We then went to on to see the recently restored apple press where Trevor House, Paul Uphill and his wife Sheila were building the "cheese". Layers of apple pumice were stacked between cloths then pressed by the water hydraulic press circa 1947. The press was bought new by Kevin's grandfather Dick House and his father Edgar Bertram House. They then handed out glasses of the freshly pressed juice for us to try—it was absolutely delicious.

The juice was pumped from the stainless steel trough to the cellars which were under the nearby farmhouse. Kevin led us across the yard to the cellar steps and gave us a potted history of the house. It was thought to have been built in the late 1700s by Lord Colston of South Gloucestershire and Bristol, the famous trader and landowner that the Colston Hall in Bristol takes its name from today. It was built as his summer residence, but was not completed until after his death. The house was then leased by the Colston family to farming tenants for over 100 years, until it was bought by Kevin's Great-great-grandfather—the aforementioned Charles Bertram House.

The cellars were brick built with great vaulted arches – they also had a resident population of bats, much to the ladies' consternation. Kevin explained they were the common Pipistrelle bats and were very important as they consumed up to 3000 insects per night, including the fruit fly which can cause the cider to go "off". The barrels used were mostly old port barrels, pipes and hogs heads. He also showed us some of the old artefacts, wooden shovels etc. There are many old wives tales about cider making – bodies in barrels, rats in barrels etc – these arise from the truth that meat protein can feed the yeast.

We went back to the fresher, bat-free air to the barn where we had a lovely supper of bread, cheese, pickles, pasties and of course – glasses of cider. It rounded off an interesting and very enjoyable evening and one of the guests Frank Naish – probably one of the oldest cider-makers in Somerset –complimented Kevin on his "medium dry"! A compliment echoed by us all.
