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THE WEST OF ENGLAND 50^{TH} ANNIVERSARY RALL AT ST. AGNES, CORNWALL $19^{TH}-21^{ST}$ AUGUST 2005

This was a very special year for the West of England Steam Engine Society as it was to be their biggest and best yet with over 100 steam engines entered in the programme

A huge investment of £80,000 was needed to put this on and I am sure that in the back of their minds was the terrible weather that washed out the show last year and caused all the devastation to the tiny

village of Boscastle not too far away along the coast.

The weather this year was to be in the shows favour and although I never arrived at the show until Saturday morning I am told that the steam road run took place on the Thursday from the show site to Porthtowan then up Engine Hill which is very steep and a good place to take photographs and video's with a break being taken at the Victory Pub no doubt for pasty's and a pint, then returning to the field. This year a huge 90 page programme was produced and when turning to the Stationary Engine list there was a nice picture of a 5hp Powell owned by Wessex member Mike Snook, Mike also took the Powell along this year. Around 20 W.S.E.C. members exhibited at the show including Torquay member David Hallett who had his 1940's Norman - Alco twin cylinder engine generating 24 volts. David told me it was used for aircraft battery charging during WW2. Club members took a nice selection of engines ranging from Amanco's, Ruston & Hornsby's, Fairbanks, United, and an Eagle. Once again the engines were in pens surrounded by metal barriers which to me seemed very strange at first, but I did find it useful to lean on when chatting to the public about my exhibit

Looking around the fairground there was a Wall of Death for the motor cycle minded and this is believed to be the only ride of it's type still on tour and last year the organising Society issued a challenge to engineers and enthusiasts to construct a steam powered motor-cycle that could be ridden around the wall and I am told that this actually happened and I believe the prize money for achieving

this was £2000 so someone went home very happy with their prize.

10 steam cars were here on show with makes such as Stanley, White, and Locomobile. I often think that when these cars were on the road in their heyday they must have been a nightmare for pedestrians crossing roads as if you did not see it you certainly would not have heard it as they ran so quiet.

The model and craft tent was once again almost bursting to the seams packed with models of all descriptions from railway and road locomotives, boats, model stationary engines, model wartime villages in France to a huge dockyard crane made from Meccano. Seeing the models made me wish I had kept my Meccano. The craft side of the marquee was very good, what gifted people there are creating allsorts of unusual items made from all kinds of materials. Situated in the field were 6 long rows of stalls, something here for everyone, plenty of food vans, and the ice cream sellers did well in the fine weather. Alan Connock and the road gang were here in attendance and drew a lot of interest from visiting public and in addition to their normal set up they had a large stone crusher operating that was powered by a traction engine. (Their Jack Russell came too and spent the weekend with his head down a hole !!) To sum up this was a great weekend our thanks to engine steward Chris Leverton for looking after us so well, he's been doing this job for 27 years, long may he continue. ROBIN

CLUB VISIT TO DERRICK HARDWICKE'S V.E.DAY AT RANGEWORTHY, Nr BRISTOL SATURDAY 3rd SEPTEMBER

Saturday 3rd of September was the date many of us had been waiting for, as once again Derrick had invited the Wessex S.E.C. along to view the Beechgrove Collection and Engine Museum. It was three years ago when we last visited this private collection and the welcome and hospitality that was

extended to us by Derrick and his wife Margaret was very much appreciated.

Amongst Derricks vast collection he has several Victoria engines manufactured by The Bristol Wagon & Carriage Works and he thought it would be a nice idea to invite Victoria owners to bring along their engines to display at the V.E.(Victoria Engines) day. I am told that there were 31 Victoria's displayed here ranging from 1½ to 7hp. This included a green one that was petrol/paraffin, surely this must have been a record having so many of this marque in one place at the same time.

There were other engines from the Beechgrove Collection running here too as Derrick and his friends moved from engine to engine starting them up. Many are lamp start and run on oil or gas, the oldest

engine dating back to 1898. Around 50 engines make up the collection.

The latest eye catching exhibit that has just been installed is a 12hp Crossley Gas Engine single flywheel that was made in 1915, this engine actually found Derrick not the other way around and he has written a book on how all this came about and hopefully this may be serialised in the S.E Magazine, it will make fantastic reading as it tells us that there are still engines to be found in their original working locations. When Derrick installed the Crossley he first had to build a concrete plinth for the engine block and another for the outrigger bearing to sit on as the flywheel weighed around 1½ tons. When the engine was all reassembled a nice wood building was installed around it complete with tin roof and sliding patio doors for outside viewing, inside the building the engine ran so quite, just the occasional click and the piston whooshing to and fro along it's cylinder.

Stationary Engine photographer and Wessex member Patrick Knight was busy taking photographs during the day so we may see one or two in the magazine. At the end of the day when things fell silent and the engine were loaded up for the journey home Derrick came around and thanked everyone for attending. A special thank you to him and Margaret for making us most welcome and John Rogers

who was engine steward designate.
