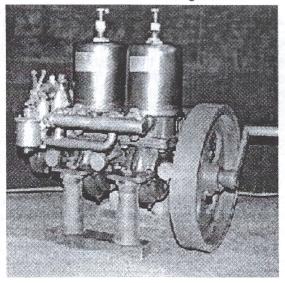

# Featured Engine No. 9 Watermota K1 & K2 engines

As the name suggests, these easily recognised engines are really marine propulsion devices, but they are often seen at rallies. Resplendent in their gleaming copper water jackets, they make an excellent display engine. They were manufactured by Walter D, Fair & company at Hampton Wick and produced at the Pembroke

Engineering Works at Kingston on Thames.

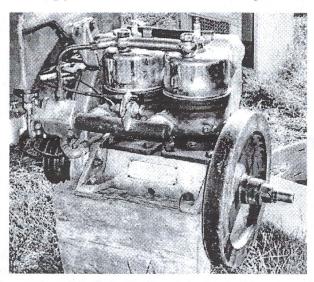
From 1912 to after the Great War, Fair's were simply importers of the American "Waterman" outboards, but in 1919 the Admiralty asked Fair's to look into the possibility of producing their own unit. The result was virtually a clone of the 1916 American engine & one may assume that the name "Watermota" was a nod to the originators.



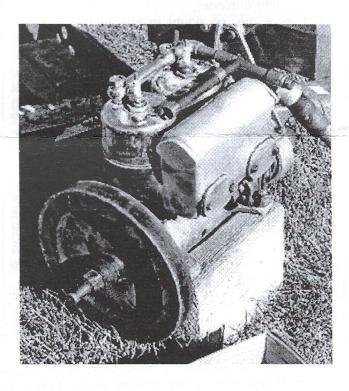
By the mid 'thirties, Fair's dropped out of outboard production, although they continued with production of the K series.

In production from 1910 (Waterman) to 1955, the single cylinder K1 turned in 3 hp & the twin cylinder version a predictable 6 hp, both at 1,050 rpm. The bore & stroke is 70mm x 760mm displacing about 300cc per cylinder. The single weighs around 45 lbs, the twin about 80lbs.

They are normally aspirated, piston ported two strokes and have no novel features that I know of, having plain bronze bush m ain bearings.



I've found pictures by Nick Highfield of a short barrelled chrome plated version looking very snazzy at a sale. Although the barrels appear to be shorter, they may just have shorter jackets to make room for deeper transfer ports.

I always look forward to this event as the stationary engine steward Chris Leverton puts the WSEC members together in the engine line, which is helpful if anyone wants to wander off as it always leaves someone in charge. Sadly, one of our group never made it this year as he was taken poorly only days before the event and admitted to hospital in a hurry, so we would like to say get better soon Mike Snook as we all missed you and Ann at the show. Writing this on 1<sup>st</sup> Sept, I hear on the grapevine that Mike is now back home.

Weatherwise, Friday was OK and dry for setting up but Saturday and part of Sunday saw driving rain with bitter cold high winds which meant I needed my old woolly hat, a Barbour jacket, two pairs of socks and wellies.
