Dancing afterwards was to the music of the Steam Machine disco.

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
#### Summer 1977

Friday night was carnival night in Kendal with nearly a hundred entries, floats and bands all in torchlight procession, a very good carnival. Unfortunately it rained and continued to do so throughout Saturday and part of Sunday, but this did not seem to deter the competitors who were polishing and cleaning their treasures well before 9 a.m., much to our dismay we were still in bed!

The spectators were not put off either by the weather indeed seemed to accept it and enjoyed it just the same. Some 17,000 people attended over the two days.

There was a very interesting and varied selection of entries, one a Clayton and Shuttleworth Thresher was particularly well preserved There were over 100 stationary engines, a grand line up of tractors, cars, motorcycles, bicycles and commercial vehicles, of different species to those seen in the South. A beautifully restored and very interesting Ruston Hornsby 1920 3 HP won the championship cup and and the best class. There was a good line up of traction engines and showmans engines. Mr Tom Varley was there with his 'Lordship' and a rare beast retreived from Australia an Atkinson in good company with 2 fodens and 6 Sentinels. Also attracting a good deal of attention was a rather strange looking 1930 Aveling and Porter Traction engine 'Hunslett' converted to a showmans type with pneumatic tyres. Everyone was very friendly and interested in me. There was a happy get together in the bar with music and dancing on Saturday evening, of course I was left behind when they went.

Monday dawned bright and sunny, off we went again up into the lakes where once more I was left in charge of things on a camp site high up above Windermere, While they went walking, climbing and sight seeing, and consuming steaks. This was a 'members' night, an exploitation of the hidden talent in the W.S.E.C.


First, Pam and Ray Saunders with some sound cine on Listers of Dursley and Sheepshearing.
