A SEARCH FOR OLD ENGINES.

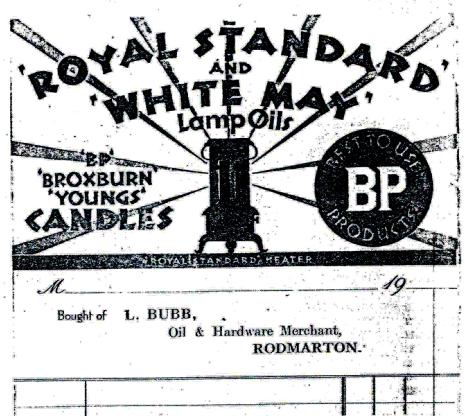
Recently, when looking through my Grandfather's early business records from the early I900's when he carried on the business of Royal Taylight Lamp Oil agent for part of Gloucestershire, I found that he had regularly delivered lamp oil to a local pumping station, which indicated the presence of a stationary engine.

Some time later when a fellow collector was visiting me, it was decided that we should pay a visit to the village to try and locate the engine. On the way to the village a windmill was spotted in a field. A quick investigation revealed only the cooling tank remaining in the old engine house. We then travelled on to my Grandfather's house, where none of his original buildings in which he stored the oil, etc., remained. A short drive through the village and we found the water tower with the pump house underneath. The gate was open, so we decided to investigate further.

A Search for Old Engines

On looking through the windows we saw, alas. only a modern diesel engine and a twin fly-wheel Lister diesel belonging to the 1940's. We were just about to turn and walk away when we saw the large silencer of a very early engine standing by the side of the wall, indicating that we were just a little too late - the engine was gone!

About a week later, a friend of my Mother's, who was also brought up in the same Cotswold village, was visiting and I was telling her of our engine hunt. She told me of a pump house across the fields near the same village where she could remember an engine running. It was thought that some of the

thought that some of the oil supplied went to this pump house. So, there were two pump houses!

Ifter checking the Ordnance Survey map and finding the pump house marked well off the beaten track, my wife and I decided to pay it a visit. We drove out as near as we could and then set out across the fields. As we rounded a corner, there it was - the second pump house! It was then a race between my son and myself to see who could get there first. The door was open and I rushed in, but alas, it was empty except for the modern water pump and two very oily bases where two engines most certainly ran years ago. We departed a little disappointed, but pleased that at least we had found the sites of the engines which had a very personal connection.

Bowlers of Beth.

This month by way of a change, instead of the Old Down Inn, W.S.E.C. members gethered in Morford Street, Bath for a visit to Camden Works Museum.

Briefly, the museum consists entirely of the contents of the works of J.B. Bowler, brass founder and engineer, and mineral water manufacturer, formerly of Corn Street and Southgate Street, Bath. Bowler started his business in 1872, specialising in the repair and manufacture of equipment used by brewers, public houses and mineral water manufacturers. During the period of the firms existance until it closed in 1969, nothing was replaced or thrown away, consequently a most marvellous collection of machinery, tools, bills, receipts, letters etc. became available showing the way of working of a small Victorian engineering business.

The sixty or so club members split into three parties with their respective guides and it soon became apparent that everyone was fascinated by the quaint relics on display. We firstly visited the machine shop consisting of overhead shafting, belts, pulleys and machine tools dating back well into the last century. This workshop could have easily been used by the Health and Safety at Work (1974) Act as an example of what Not to do!! Displayed here on the balcony were some of the letters received by Bowlers from customers or suppliers - all amusing, some complimentary, others not so, some demanding, pleading, requesting - and even summonsing!

We next all moved on to the old office, with the hard chairs, partners desk, ink well, cast iron grate, gas lamps and ledgers exactly as used right up to 1969 all through the firms existence.

Next the pattern shop, followed by the foundry - examples here of scrap "jobs" being kept in case they came in useful later on. Finally the finishing or fitting shop; here once again were examples of Victorian tools, tinsmiths' rollers and beaters, small treadle bench lathes, grindstones etc.

Upto this point ones imagination could conjure up the works turning out Stationary Engine parts, run by the W.S.E.C. - for example, who else but Tom Randall in the foundry, Bill Appleby and Rod Dring on hand maintaining the belts and keeping the machinery going; Stuart Ashman looking after the records, Diana Emery bashing away on the vintage typewriter, John Spear assisting with the ledgers and Herb Gane driving the "ancient Napier Lorry" around Wessex delivering Amanco and Bamford spares as sold by Michael Cannon.

Alas - only a dream and we passed on into the Mineral Water factory. Here we were shown the original carbon dioxide generator and carbonating pump, to put the fizz in the ginger beer, the bottling and labelling plant, the essence room and so on. Bottle collectors, Ann Brain and Stephen Emery, were overheard planning a big raid, both green with envy as this department was a collectors' dream. However all the exhibits were found to be wired together!!

A rather frightening machine consisting of a large horizontal bristle brush rotated by crank links and a treadle, started some interesting speculation as to its use but it turned out to be merely a bottle cleaner. Equally fearsome was the labelling machine which the operator sat astride to operate.

After studying the nicely displayed publicity pictures, calendars, examples of bottle types, stoppers, openers, catalogues, labels etc. we found ourselves back in the foyer from whence we were ushered into the lecture room for coffee. Here an impromptu meeting was held, newsletters distributed, late subscriptions paid up, insurance certificates and badges sold, rally entry forms passed around and we finally dispersed around 10.00 pm. after a very enjoyable evening.
