## BRISTOL DOCKS RALLY

In marked contrast to last year, the weather gods of Wessex looked favourably on the I.Plant E. Gas-Up Rally at Bristol Docks on the 15th & 16th May. The venue as usual was adjacent to the Industrial Museum in an enclosure bounded by bollards and chains which must rank as one of the strongest safety barriers to be currently found on the rally scene.

Whilst those attending on the Saturday settled down to preparing their exhibits, accompanying wives disappeared towards the shops followed by pensive looks, as thoughts of possible new aquisitions evaporated in the face of various shopping expeditions. Despite such dreary thoughts the relative peace was soon shattered as engines were started and curious passers-by gathered in front of reluctant starters with unexpected problems!

A total of twenty-two engines were exhibited over the two days comprising:— Amanco Hired Man, Bamford 4 hp. open crank, Bentall Pioneer, Blackstone 10 hp. (a most impressive lorry mounted exhibit), Fairbanks Z 3 hp., three Lister D's, Lister Junior, Petter M  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hp. New Model, Powell 6 hp., Ruston Hornsby IP, 5 hp., Stuart Lighting Set, Thorneycroft 10 hp. (ex-marine Sausage Machine??)., Victoria 5 hp., Villiers WX-II, Wolseley WD2, Stationary steam being represented by Merryweather and Bryan Donkin (the owners of which were noted to be enviously eyeing up the local coal yard nearby!!). All in all, a fine selection of engines, several of which were driving associated equipment. During the weekend were were joined on the dockside by a gathering of Military Vehicles and Vintage Cars - predominantly American; all of which attracted disdainful glances from the "weekend commodores" in the docks.

Sunday brought voting for the I.Plant E. award; the winner this year was John Emery with his superbly restored and presented Ruston IP on its first outing. The award was presented by Don Govan (Chairman of the I.Plant E., Western Branch) who had driven up from Exmouth especially to present it.

To sum up, a most enjoyable event for which thanks must be made to Eddie May for his excellent organisation.

# SEDGEMOOR VINTAGE RALLY, May 22nd and 23rd

The stormy weather did nothing to deter exhibitors and members of the public from attending this, the second rally organised by the Gremlins Carnival Club at Bridgwater. The site was very similar to the one we use at Yatton. This, too, was a rugby field. With well over 100 exhibits of vintage motorbikes, cars, stationary engines, tractors and traction engines, together with trade stands, local charity stalls and children's roundabouts, there was plenty of entertainment for all.

The stationary engine section was sited down one side with ample room behind the engines for tents, trailers, cars, etc. About 70 engines were on show and it was unusual to see 3 Powell engines and 4 Blackstone lamp-starts at the same rally. I think all stationary engine enthusiasts would agree that this was the best example of engines we have seen at a small rally for a long time. Not only was there a good selection, but without exception, restoration was to a high standard. Other than the Powells and Blackstones already mentioned there were Ruston and Hornsbys, varying from 2 to 7 hp. Various Listers, Petters Bamfords, Crossleys, Amancos, JAPs, Wolseleys, Fairbanks, a Stuart Turner, an Ingeco and a Duzgo (and it did!).

During each afternoon entertainment was given by the Bridgwater Sapphire Jazettes, the Caledonian Majorettes, the local Sea Cadets Band and we were treated to a demonstration of Karate for anyone interested in this art of self defence (now I know how to protect myself!).

At one point the whole area was blotted out with thick smoke, "who's \*\*\*\*\* Petter's that?" was heard as we all peered thro' the fog - but this time we couldn't blame a Petter but a neighbouring house with a chimney fire.

The weekend ended far too soon with the parade of Vintage bikes, cars, tractors and traction engines and it was time to receive our plaques, which were a credit to any club, being cast brass picturing an oiler.

There were a few engines which sold at the following prices; List D £30, Lister Ricardo  $6\frac{1}{2}$  hp. £52, Crossley e/c  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hp. £160.

True to form the auctioneers kept the piece-de-resistance until last. This was the 1907 hot tube Crossley which had been the object of discussion throughout the day. Not many people wanted to buy it, but all wanted to see "how much". Age was an asset instead of a liability, and it sold for £775.
