SALE OF VINTAGE MACHINERY, VEHICLES AND BYGONES. STOURPAINE BUSHES Sept. 21st. 1979

The sale got off to a good start weatherwise and the array of things lying around waiting to be sold, provided considerable interest, and sometimes amusement, to a sizeable crowd.

A few W.S.E.C. members were in evidence and many familiar faces from the Dorset area. A sprinkling of others making strange noises (local dialect) also made themselves

The lines of Stationary Engines were to us of course the main interest, and to all club members, I should think, a pleasure to behold.

Of Listers, I should think one could have found almost every vintage type made. Strange names? Not many, but plenty of generating sets and pumps available to those who want to give their angine a job to do.

The biggest engine was a 1922 Crossley 25 H.P. open crank. I fancy we had seen this before,

somewhere. It sold for £460.

In due course, we made our way to Lot 238, visions of that pretty little engine on the cover of the last"Stationary Engine" magazine, called the "Waterloo Boy". Alas in it's place stood a rather squat, horizontal, two stroke Fairbanks Morse, with everything n enclosed. Not very attractive, but for £100 it became the apple of someboby's eye. Proceeding down the lines, and at intervals passing knots of enthusiasts, talking about

erything in general, and engines in particular, we frequently heard the name "John Deere"

mentioned with a note of respect. We found it Lot 239, a nice little engine, an easy size to take around. Low tension, exhaust valve and igniter operated by a single rod, governing mechanism totally enclosed, wet sump lubrication, no drip feed, lacking any brasswork(so dear to our fraternity) and lacking many of the jigging, jogging bits, which so fascinate the public. (it was enclosed crank) I can only assume it was it's rarity which pushed it's selling price up to £260. Of course open cranks were the elite. Other prices were as follows: Lister Ds from £14 to £42, according to condition, Fairbanks Morse 6HP E/C, unrestored, £140, Amanco Hired Man H/T, very rough, £95, Ruston Hornsby 42HP P.R. 0/C, good condition £250, Witte 3HP 0/C£220, Blackstone vertical E/C £125, Witte drag saw, working order £170, Lister A 3HP, show condition £45; Petter 12HP "Apple top", £164, an attractive small piston pump with lots of brass £30 Ruston centrifugal pump £20.

What we noticed was the little difference between the value of a restored engine and unrestored,

of the same type. It seems that people want to say "All me own work".

Altogether this was a most interesting sale, and the weather was helpful. We would like to recommend that next years sale be advertised as at "Stourpaine Stones" as there are a few more of them than there are "bushes". Foot note:

n the auctioneer sold Lot 238, (as before mentioned), he sold it as a "Waterloo Boy", no mention of a substitute, no objection from the crowd, so was it? Pity Napoleon can't tell us. Ems.

Petter M Type, owned by Mr. Stokes of Bridgend, the Sundial given to Mr. Thomas of Worcester by Australian engine enthusiasts, Terry Heath's Fartop and pump, K.Reader's Teles and pump, and Peter Steele's Lister sheep shearing outfit from Devizes.

Saturday's ploughing match brought a silver rose bowl into the hands of Wessex Club Member Ian Craddock from Trowbridge, driving his Fordson Standard with Ransomes plough, for the best finish. Congratulations Ian! Saturday finished with a barbecue and a general chit-chat around an enormous bonfire.

Sunday turned out to be dull and rather cool, but the quiet of the morning was soon disturbed by the enormous roar of a gas torch which was under a pan of sausages in Rob Lambert's camp!

The crowd turned out to be about average, considering the weather, and I must thank the Sodbury Vale Group and particularly Ann and Rob Woolford for a real friendly and enjoyable weekend.

 The evening meeting commenced promptly at 8.00pm. but was disappointingly attended by only 30 members - 20% of the membership! The reason for this decline in attendance is difficult to analyse; can anyone please enlighten us? It cannot be the cost of petrol as a number of members came quite good distances (perhaps they drained their engines tanks to do so now the rally season is over!). Perhaps it is the Old Down Inn's heating system, or the "Fishnet" decor! Anyway, 130 or so Wessex members missed a first class professional, slide illustrated talk by Paul Elkin, curator of Bristol Industrial Museum. He held our attention with his fascinating account of Bristol's industrial history, how, from being a port, many industries grew up, such as paper, cotton, glass, tobacco, etc. Also, Bristol being on a coalfield, and having other mineral resources closeby, such as iron ore, calamine, etc., engineeering and ship building industries developed rapidly in the 18th. & 19th. centuries, strongly linked with the name of I.K.Brunel. The selection of slides showed Bristol to be historically one of the country's most interesting cities, both industriall and aesthetically, even though it has been rather thin on stationary engine manufacturers! After the interval when most glasses and mugs had been refilled, Paul spoke about his own work at the museum, its exhibits, (and Fred, the restorer of ncient machinery!), and his future plans. From this we could see that there is more to running a museum than just filling a large building with old bits and pieces and opening the doors to the public each morning. He concluded by offering the Club a conducted tour one evening, including parts not open to the public. From the names of manufacturers of some of the items in store and in the workshop, this offer sounded most attractive. This should be something to look forward to next year. The evening was concluded around IO.30pm. and we all dispersed after thanking Paul for a most interesting and informative evening.

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


