W.S.E.C. PUBLIC LIABILITY INSURANCE, or, "What does your Insurance Certificate really mean?"

Wessex Members have Public Liability Insurance Cover for a limit of indemnity of £250,000.

This is with the PHOENIX Insurance Co., through our brokers, Stewart Wrightson(Western) Ltd.

The policy at present indemnifies the Club, its Committee, and its members, but the Club has never been able to include Junior members in this insurance on the grounds that they are minors and not at an age of civil responsibility. Recently the Committee has made an effort to change this situation and from its discussions with John Bolt, of Stewart Wrightson, he has informed us that the Phoenix have said, "Persons over the age of 18 should be responsible for their own actions, but they (the Phoenix) would not be prepared to indemnify persons under 16."

Discussions will continue, but at present any Junior member rallying an engine is the responsibility of his or her parent or guardian, who should be a member of the Club in order to gain the protection of the Club's public liability policy.



GREAT ENGINEERS AND THEIR LIVES SERIES. No.13. Proffessor Frank Flyball, 1875 - 1950.

Frank Flyball rose to fame for his work on the development of carburrettor floats and the introduction of the revolutionary 'tickle button'. This, together with his extensive research into cylinder lubricating liquids which have virtually eliminated piston slap, elevated him to the position of Governor of a famous London Engineering College, where he practiced his many 'slap and tickle' theories with several of his students.

It is far from being common knowledge that he was responsible for the education of Miss Victoria Line, reputedly the first qualified female engineer and whose work on hot tube ignition will never be forgotten. Victoria married afellow student, the famous Dutch inventor, Otter van-Ever, who flooded the world with Hot Bulbs from the equally famous 'Blow Lamp' area of Amsterdam.

Rumour has it that they met at the 1923 Engineering Exhibition in London, where they held one of the great Engineering Balls of all time. It is beleived that Victoria was suitably impressed by Otter's abundance of layshaft theories, which improved his ignition timing almost to perfection. They were married in 1924.
