LOOKING BACK – Part 7

When looking many years ago where to hold our Annual Club Rally, it was always a major topic at Committee Meetings and the train of thought was to find an existing venue that would complement us and we could compliment them. After several ideas and locations were looked at, Monkton Farleigh Mine came out on top and after discussions with the Mine, a date was set for our event.

A strange place many thought, with nothing above ground to see except nicely kept grass areas and tarmac roadways and a small loading bay for lorries to back up to.

What was below ground was to open our eyes at the magnitude of this underground site.

Originally it was a Quarry with much of its cut stone helping to build the city of Bath.

Then at the outbreak of WW2, it was extended with more tunnels to become the world's biggest ammunition store complete with its own railway connection from the main line, near box Tunnel.

All exhibitors here were given a tour on the Saturday evening, each of us carrying a torch or lantern.

Our guide at one point asked us all to switch of our lights and stare into the darkness as he switched on a light some quarter mile away and we could just see the faint glow if we looked hard. The Guide then switched on the mines lighting and we could see the magnitude of the labyrinth, in the heart of the mine was what we all wanted to see, a huge Generating Plant with a massive engine like what would power a ship! Hundreds of staff would have worked down here, many were bussed in, including some from Frome.

Interestingly, workers were not allowed to take food in, as it would encourage rats that could chew into the explosives.

I had to smile at the fan that drew the stale air from the mine, it was like looking into a jumbo jet engine with a line of prison jail bars in front of it to stop anyone being sucked in!!

It was estimated over 4 million tons of explosives were stored here and should there have been a mishap the explosion would have lasted for weeks causing damage to many villages and towns in the area. Robin

PHOTO COMPETITION



MY LISTER AUTOTRUCK

I've always been fascinated by these odd-looking 3 wheel industrial tugs after I was lucky enough, along with a few others, to have been able to drive one around the Morwellham Quay site on setup day back in 2019 ahead of the rally over the weekend.


First appearing in the 20's and 30's and made up until the 1970's, these machines could often be seen around factories,



powered by a JAP engine. Subsequent improvements

led to Listers own LD1 and LD2 air cooled diesel engines being fitted. The truck can either be driven by the driver sat on the seat, using the handlebars and controls contained thereon or it can be used as a motorised pallet truck if the steering handle (and power unit) was rotated 180 degrees, the operator then walked behind the truck.





I was looking for an Autotruck ever since that first experience of one and back in late 2020, one came up on Marketplace. Just what I wanted, a twin cylinder LD2 7hp engined one, short wheelbase and the added bonus of a nicely engineered and plated crane assembly on the back. A deal was done with the owner and in between lockdowns, I ventured up into Derbyshire very early one morning to fetch it.

The owner certainly cherished the truck but had found the rough ground conditions of the rural moorland location didn't suit it, so it was time to sell it on, to replace it with something more suitable. A deal was done, the truck was loaded, and I took a few pictures (as you do) and I made the long journey home.

The truck has obviously been restored to a good standard some years ago, with many new parts and fresh paint. It starts easily, does what it is supposed to do and gets a lot of attention!

I've removed the crane for the moment, but it is a fairly simple operation to refit it with 4 large fixings.

I had always toyed with the idea of obtaining an age-related registration for it; with the help and assistance of the Autotruck Club, a few certified photos, a V55/5 form duly filled out with a payment of £55, I was pleased to be assigned the number ETL 185C for the truck. So, now, I can drive the truck up the pasty shop in my local town quite legally to get my breakfast!! The picture to the right is ETL 185C before her maiden voyage on Easter Sunday.



TAPPETS TEA-TIME TEASERS

- 1. **Neutron**. In the middle of every atom is the nucleus. The nucleus contains two types of subatomic particles, protons and neutrons. The protons have a positive electrical charge and the neutrons have no electrical charge.
- 2. **Russia**. Lake Baikal, in Siberia, holds the distinction of being both the deepest lake in the world and the largest freshwater lake, holding more than 20% of the unfrozen fresh water on the surface of Earth. It is 5315 feet (1620 meters) deep.
- 3. **Clockwise**. A record that is playing properly will be spinning to the right (also known as clockwise). In other countries (including Australia) records are actually designed to spin counterclockwise instead.
- 4. **William I.** On Christmas Day in 1066, after defeating King Harold II at the Battle of Hastings, William I 'The Conqueror' was crowned King at Westminster Abbey.
- 5. A **Nautical mile**. A nautical mile is based on the circumference of the earth, and is equal to one minute of latitude. It is slightly more than a statute (land measured) mile (1 nautical mile = 1.1508 statute miles).
- 6. **Green**. The Commons chamber is small and modestly decorated in green, unlike the large, lavishly furnished red Lords chamber. Benches sit on both sides of the chamber and are divided by a centre aisle.
- 7. **Kelvin Diesels** is a manufacturer of marine Diesel engines based in Glasgow. The company's engines are used in a variety of vessels such as fishing boats and small tugs. The company was founded in 1904 by Walter Bergius as the "Bergius Car & Engine Company". Bergius set about developing his first car which he named the "Kelvin". The car was not a commercial success. However, its engine proved to be an excellent marine engine following trials in a rowing gig in 1906.
- 8. **Paella** is one of the best-known dishes in Spanish cuisine. For this reason, many non-Spaniards view it as Spain's national dish, but Spaniards almost unanimously consider it to be a dish from the Valencian region.
- 9. **376.36 mph** (605.69 km/h). The first official Federation Internationale de Motocyclisme (FIM) record was set in 1920, when Gene Walker rode an Indian on Daytona Beach at 104.12 mph (167.56 km/h). Since late 2010, the Ack Attack team has held the motorcycle land speed record at 376.36 mph.
- 10. The largest word is **five thousand** with no repeating letter the smallest word would be **zero** or **nought** (or if you allow negatives **minus forty**).
