CHAIRMANS REPORT

This will start at 8pm and will be at The Old Down Inn Emborough. At the end of September, on the last Monday of the month, a talk on the Westonzoyland Pumping Station. This will be seen as getting our evenings at the Old Down back to something approaching normal, but we are still needing to find more entertainment for you all for the end of year and into 2023. UNUSUAL ENGINE – COVENTRY VICTOR MIDGET INFORMATION FEEDBACK

Info received from Club member Philip Hawkins indicates these engines were used by the military for a variety of applications as a 'prime mover' for aircraft ground support services. Trolley mounted, hydraulic systems (but not limited to) for the servicing and maintenance of aircraft whilst on the ground at any location globally. Variants in my time (1985 - 2015) were: CV AN2 & AN4 denoting number of cylinders so, 2 cyl & 4 cylinder. My 1st encounter was at RAF Binbrook in Lincolnshire (85 - 87) on English Electric Lightnings. Used for powering ac hydraulic systems as previously mentioned. Other smaller applications would have been fuel & water pumps and occasionally air compressors. *Thanks Philip! Ed*
