MY TRIUMPH T10 TRIKE – By Mary Chapman, continued.....

......Anyway, the next day I had a day off and sure enough Stan Jackson rang me from California USA and wanting to check if this was some prank, I asked a question that had bugged me. This scooter was well engineered but there was one very fancy chrome nut on a bar that did appear to do nothing, and it just looked odd so being me I went straight to asking him why and then it became clear and made some sense.

The trike not only tilted like a bike with the same steering, however, the two back wheels stay on the road as the scooter pivots behind the seat. There was a pedal on the floor both sides, the left hand side pedal of the scooter which was to be deployed when approaching a junction this was to lock the



scooter so that it would not pivot and stop the process of the tilt and swivel. On its test run it was discovered that as it was on the clutch side, drivers, would get confused and press it like a clutch (*Fordson E27N owners will know this well!!.....Ed*) and then lock everything up and possibly crash which indeed did happen hence the fancy chrome nut placed on the bar that looked out of place. Information only gleaned from talking to Stan Jackson.

Anyway, we had a lovely chat and I jotted the history down, as with all research further evidence often crops up and although the main story does not change, however, with access to some old photos the history and then the failings may become a little more interesting to fellow enthusiasts. The company had been known for not only pedal bicycles and trikes but also for invention in the 1920's and 1930 for motorcycles.

George Wallis was well known back in the day for speedway motorcycles and racing and even the HUB steerer. The early Wallis and Company was based in Bromley.

The tricycle was the forerunner of the design for the trike Scooter and Stan designed the gearbox mechanism. The workshop received 12 scooters from Triumph/ BSA and went on to make 12 prototypes built buy G Wallis Ltd bicycle company in Waltham on Thames in the 1960's and this followed the design of a tricycle.

In the middle to late 1960,s George Wallis was negotiating with Triumph for the scooters. Triumph who themselves were in difficulties as there were negotiations taking place at the same time for BSA and Triumph to amalgamate. Both firms had research and development teams. Triumph supported the development and supplied 12 T10 scooters for development by Wallis Company Ltd which was completed.



The amalgamation of BSA and Triumph saw that 6 scooters were sent to BSA and six to Triumph as both had research and development teams.

The six Triumph had several were sold off and local businesses bought them, one was used as a fire tender to go up and down the



production lines as factories in those day were often half a mile long, another went to the Museum and mine was not sold off until the demise of Triumph and the close of the factory where it was sold off with just 26 miles on the clock. I found one more that had the metal back removed and a wooden one built but this has been lost track of over the years.

An early prototype of the Arial 3 was tested by Vic Willoughby of The Motorcycle

News, appeared in print in May 1988

BSA took theirs apart and developed the Arial 3 of which Pete Murrey the legendry disc jockey on the 60's and 70's was photographed promoting them.

Prior to agreeing to work with BSA and Triumph George Wallis had the foresight to only agree to a three-year contract and he was so

disappointed by what BSA had done he packed it all up and sold to Daihatsu in 1971/72 I currently still own this old and quirky trike.

To my amazement when taken out to the Classic Bike Show at the Royal Bath and West Show Ground recently the Trike was the winner of the Best Three-Wheeler/Side Car section.

HINTS AND TIPS

If when you are restoring an engine and you wish to line the paintwork, there is only one method which gives a satisfactory result to the amateur painter and that is to use tape to mark out the outline you require and then paint in between the two lines of tape to give you the required line. Masking tape is no good for this purpose because it will not give a sharp edge to the line. There is a tape available for this purpose called "Fine Line Tape"

This is available from motor factors, bodyshops and the dreaded ebay. It comes in widths of 3mm and 6mm.
