THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE WESSEX STATIONARY ENGINE CLUB LTD



Some of you might recall during joining the Club or upon renewal, there is a small checkbox




SEEND FAIR FROM YESTERYEAR - 1971



A little time ago I was lent a programme from the Seend Traction engine Rally held July 24th-25th1971. Fifty two years ago, I remember going to one of the early ones with my father but I cannot recall in what year that would have been. Looking at the programme it was a very well supported event with 22 stationary engines ranging from Amancos, Petters, Ruston & Hornsby, four in all and all horizontal - the earliest a 1925 model, Lister, Powell, Crossley, Blackstone, Wolseley and JAP engines, they were all there.

Now one of our late members Mr Ron Torr was in attendance with a 40ft long Stenner & Gumm rack saw, a Marshall and a Foster threshing drums, a Jones Tiger Baler and many more working displays, one that stands out being a tree loading demonstration by H. J. Harding & Sons of Broughton Gifford, a well-known firm in the Melksham/Trowbridge area.





Traction engines....well with over twenty on site it must have been one of the best early steam events in the area, Fowler 20223 Supreme built in 1934, Burrell 3888 1921 General Gough, this engine was rescued from a gravel pit near Oxford and then returned to steam and in full working order in around a year. Another great enginge that came to Seend was Burrell 3938 "Quo Vadis" of 1922 it then belonged if my memory serves me right to Mr. Hines of Shaftesbury, now being owned by Robert Coles again of Shaftesbury, (would it not be great to see that engine at Southwick in 2024?) we will see what we can do. There were many more but I will not bore you all with a full list and anyway I'd run out of ink in the printer! I will just mention the wonderful old adverts in the programme; firms I remember from the area, sadly many now gone and forgotten by many. I hope the photographs taken from the old programme will be of interest to you. *Eric Gay*

A few hardy Club members made their way on a very cold and frosty Saturday morning in December to the South Somerset Agricultural Preservation Club's Crank-Up/Vintage meet at the Queens Arms pub at Stoke St Mary, just outside of Taunton.

The warm bar area inside the pub became a favourite spot for some when they got too cold, the hot food they served was spot on too and warmed us up somewhat. 
FACEBOOK MARKETPLACE SCAM ADVERTS

If you're a member of Facebook, you'll no doubt look through various Marketplace adverts from time to time. It offers no buyer protection whatsoever compared to eBay should anything go wrong. Fraudsters and other undesirables take maximum advantage of this, often stealing photos of recent for sale items, advertising them at often stupidly low prices to tempt a buyer, then insisting on a bank transfer to either buy or secure the item, then they block you and disappear.

There was a prime example of this on our Facebook group recently – a member shared what looked like to be a nicely presented 5hp Blackstone engine – to most people it looked a very reasonably priced engine, but to




others the alarm bells started ringing. It was far, far too cheap to start with – at £4000 it was half or thereabouts of what it should be.



To the untrained eye it would be easy to be sucked in with their attractively priced engine – but as soon as that holding or even full payment is sent, you'd be blocked by the 'seller' with no way of finding them again and zero chance of locating them in person.

Looking through their profile, their 'Other Items' listed are high value desirable items, again, priced stupidly low, again to tempt that online buyer.



Also, another giveaway would be the odd-looking friends list – mainly made up of a few foreign 'odd-bods'.

So....it's buyer beware! And if it looks too good to be true, it usually is....remember that and you won't usually go too far wrong. Sadly, no amount of reporting these scammers/fake accounts to Facebook seems to have any effect either. *K. Parsons*
